CUBA TO HOLD ELECTION SOON

President, Vice President and Other Officials to Be Voted Upon.

(By Associated Press to The Coos Bay Times)

HAVANA, Oct. 19.—Cuba's approaching presidential elections, which, if nothing develops in the meantime to prevent them, are to take place on November 1, will be the second to be held by Cubans without American supervision. The first election, that of 1905, which resulted in placing Estrada Palma in the presidential chair for the second time, was accompanied by disorders, followed by threats of revolution, culminating in the outbreak of August, 1906, directed by Dr. Alfredo Zayas and General Pino Guerra, and precipitated the second American intervention under Governor Magoon. During this intervention was held under the supervision of the American army officers the election of 1908, which resulted in the election of General Jose Miguel Gomez and Dr. Zayas by a substantial majority. The election was marked by the absence of any disorders other than small partisan squabbles.

The rival candidates for the presidency and vice presidency now are Dr. Zayas and Gen. Eusebio Hernandez for the Liberal party and Gen. Mario G. Menocal and Dr. Enrique Varona Suarez for the Conservative party, also known as the Patriotic Alliance and as the Fusion party, in allusion to the recent defection of Gen. Asbert, governor of Havana province, from the Liberal ranks and his espousal of the Conservative cause. In the platform of principles of both parties there is absolutely no difference.

Besides the president and the vice president there are to be elected 13 of the 24 senators, 49 of the 95 representatives who compose the lower house, the governors of the six provinces, mayors and city councilmen of the 95 municipalities into which the island is divided and some minor officials. The ballot gives the voter the fullest protection of secrecy.

ALL EAT APPLES ON NOVEMBER 18

An Effort to Make "Apple Day" a National Event.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 16.—The governors of all the Pacific coast states are to be asked to issue a proclamation declaring Monday, November 18, "apple day," an effort having been originated here to have everybody in the United States eat at least one apple on that day and give the entire day over to one monster celebration in honor of the northwest's greatest product. The day will mark the opening of the Northwest land products show in Portland, and those in charge of the show will make the effort to have the price of apples brought within the reach of all, on that day at least. The celebration will be similar to California's raisin day, and the housewives and hotels will be asked to serve apples in every style on "apple day."

Oregon and Washington apples will be freely distributed all along the Pacific slope in order to give the celebration impetus.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

It is estimated that the new steam schooner under construction at North Bend, Coos Bay, for the Dodge interests, will cost approximately \$140,000. She is to have accommodations for 55 passengers and will be ready for service about March 1.—Oregonian.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—Waterlogged with only its masts and part of deck load above water, the schooner Dauntless was towed into the harbor last night by the steam schooner St. Helens after the two vessels had collided Sunday evening in a dense fog off Point Arena. That the schooner was not sent to the bottom of the ocean was probably due to little 6-year-old Caroline Peterson, daughter of Captain J. T. Peterson, of the Dauntless. The child, who was on deck at the time was the first to see the black form of the steamer in the fog and called to her father, who was at the wheel. The vessel was swung from its course just in time and hit the steamer a glancing blow.

J. O. STEMMLER ANNOUNCES HIS PLATFORM
I believe in direct presidential primaries.
I believe in the direct vote for United States senators, and until this can be obtained, in Statement No. 1.
If elected I will live up to and enforce all laws, including the Oregon System.
I believe in a revision of the judicial system with a view of simplifying, expediting and cheapening justice.
I believe in and will work for state aid for permanent county roads scientifically built under sound business management.
I will work for such legislation as will open Rogue river to commercial fishing to residents of Curry county.
If elected I will work for the establishment of an experimental agricultural station for Coos and Curry counties, having been one of the first citizens in Coos county to advocate such a move.
I believe that all local questions, such as the establishment of county boundaries, etc., should be left to be settled by vote of the parties in the localities interested.
I favor and will work for the creation of a separate prosecuting attorney district for Coos and Curry counties, for which the people have already asked.
I believe and will work for the adoption of an Industrial Compensation Act, whereby each industry will promptly and automatically compensate all persons injured by its operations, without recourse to the Courts.
I believe in legislation relieving the sheriff's office of the collection of taxes, placing it in the hands of a special officer, also a uniform system of collecting, auditing and handling same in every county throughout the state.
I believe in a reasonable exemption of household and personal effects from taxation, to a valuation of \$500.00.
If elected, I will work for the abolishment of the office of County School Supervisor, as I consider it a useless expenditure of public money.
If elected, I will use my best efforts for the passage of the so-called Blue Sky Law, prohibiting the operation of fake corporations in this state.
If elected, I will refuse to represent any faction and will always aid any resident of the district in any meritorious legislation.
