The first intimation the crowd had of the strong currents of air at the height to which Mr. Christofferson had arisen came when in making a turn at about the greatest altitude he reached...

Once or twice he removed his hands from the steering wheel, gliding along in the air like a bird. After his second flight he landed over near the depot to have his machine handy to transfer it from the wheels to the scow...

Night Flight Arranged. Last night's flight was not arranged, in fact wasn't suggested, until supper time. None of those who witnessed the flights in the day time had the temerity to suggest such a thing...

NIGHT FLIGHT AROUSES MANY

Christofferson's Moonlight Ascend Surprise to Hundreds.

Last night's moonlight flights by Aviator Christofferson caused much commotion around town. It was not generally known that he was going to fly last evening and when the people in their homes, in play-houses, churches and other places heard the whirring sound, they were puzzled...

Some thought it was one of the speed boats in the bay, others that it was an auto or a motorcycle and consequently many did not get out to see Christofferson soaring around in the twilight...

Mr. Christofferson intended to take up one or two passengers in his flights yesterday but the fairgrounds from where his machine had to start was so soft that he did not dare to attempt it...

A special train from Myrtle Point and Coquille brought over a hundred people here to witness the exhibition.

The plan is to have a flight each forenoon and two each afternoon. This will enable practically everyone who comes to Marshfield either day to witness one of the most remarkable exhibitions of the age.

Mr. Christofferson will start from the Bay, circle over the town and surrounding section and alight. In addition to the exhibition itself, the flights Wednesday and Thursday will afford an additional feature in that local people are planning to accompany him each trip. He has agreed to carry four people for The Times and the balance he will have to charge for.

On the other trips, Mr. Christofferson will make a charge of \$15 for each passenger and will carry them ten miles. E. W. Steele, W. S. Turpen and a number of others have already made applications. These applications are being taken at The Times office.

OAKLAND WINS THE 1912 PENNANT

Oakland won all four games Saturday and Sunday, while Vernon won three and lost one. Had Vernon won all four games the team would have secured the winning or had Oakland lost one of the four games Vernon would have won, so the result narrowed down to a very close contest.

COAST LEAGUE WOULD CUT BALL SCORES

Plan for Different Arrangement for World's Series Is Considered.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—A plan to cut the players' share of the receipts of the world's series of baseball games will be given serious consideration by the national baseball commission this winter, August Herrman, chairman of the commission, is one of the advocates of the scheme which will limit each member of the winning team to \$1000, while the losers get \$750. This money is to be deducted from 60 percent of the first four games, the balance to be distributed equally among the players of the other 14 major league clubs.

SERBIAN ARMY IS PRAISED BY EUROPEAN MILITARY MEN

Other Countries Did Not Expect Such Victories by That Nation.

ALLIED FORCES ARE STILL WINNING

Turks Lose Important Stronghold But Soon to Be Reinforced.

BELGRADE, Oct. 28.—The Serbian troops have taken the town of Mitrovitza on the railroad to the north of Uskup, and Verlovitza has also fallen into their hands, the Turks abandoning great quantities of ammunition and modern rifles and guns. All the neighboring towns are surrendering to the Serbians.

Europe Praises.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—European military circles are sounding the praises of the Serbian armies' achievements. The Serbians, from whom Europe did not expect much, are now in possession of virtually the whole of old Serbia and in conjunction with the Montenegrins hold the best part of the district of Novipazar.

Great Stroke.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—In one of the greatest strokes of their campaign the Bulgarians have cut the railroad between Constantinople and Adrianople and has thus isolated the latter city. This was indicated today in a special dispatch from Sofia, which declares the invaders had seized a Turkish military train on the railroad.
