Owners of Canned Milk Institution May Have to Move Plant.

The condensary has been unable to obtain sufficient milk here to op-erate it at full capacity and unless arrangements can be made to increase the supply, it may be neces-sary to move the condensary. Mr. Duffy said today that the

North Bend condensary was turning out a better grade article than any and that they had established a market for its output at a higher price than the other concerns were getting. However, they are unable to fill their orders and are thus crippling their trade. Not long ago they supplied a carload to the Brooklyn Navy Yard and could have sold much more to the government had they been able to supply it. Only last Saturday, Manager George Sheridan had to run down an order for 4000 cases of milk. Mr. Duny says that San Francisco markets call for about a carload a day if they could supply it, but they cannot turn out more than a carload a
