Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up a number of street improvement projects and other municipal matters.

Loses Hat.—Someone took Marshal Carter's fine new hat from his office a few days ago. They evidently did it as a joke and meanwhile the Marshal has to wear his old headgear even on dress occasions.

Will Give Party.—The young people of the Methodist church will give a party in the Finnish hall next Friday evening, Nov. 1. All will meet at the Methodist church not later than 8:30 o'clock and are also requested to bring their nickles and pennies.

Second Smokestack.—A second large smokestack is being erected at the C. A. Smith mill and is for the new pulp mill. It is of concrete and will be 200 feet high, not quite as high as the other large one for the mill and electric plant, which is about 240 feet high.

Plan to Build.—The Bradley Candy company is planning to erect a three-story building on its lot on North Front street, near its intersection with Broadway. The building is planned to be three stories, 50x100, and the lower stories will be utilized for the factory and offices of the company.

Involves \$150,000.—The 3,000 acres of timberland on the Coquille which is involved in the suit of Mrs. J. M. McDonald vs. M. J. McDonald and his wife is now worth about \$150,000. Charges and counter charges of fraud are being made. M. J. McDonald insists that the deed which he gave his brother for the land was merely a mortgage to secure a number of notes amounting to about \$32,000. He claims to have paid these notes and now wants his brother's widow to deed back the land. She insists he has no claim on the land. Both families are well to do and while they have always resided in San Francisco, the deceased Capt. McDonald is well remembered by old residents. M. J. McDonald, better known as Jasper, owns considerable property on the Coquille. Henry Sengstacken became involved in the case by having acted as agent for M. J. McDonald here. C. R. Peck is representing M. J. McDonald in the litigation.
