

ORGANS LIVE WITHOUT BODY

Scientist Makes Animal's Heart Beat Ten Hours After Removal.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Another step forward in Dr. Alexander Caroli's experiments in looking into the prolongation of life is announced by the Rockefeller institute for medical research. He has succeeded in separating from the body of animals, the heart, stomach, liver, intestines, kidneys and bladder and in having these organs live and functionate under his eyes for ten hours. The excised organ is placed in a solution supplied with blood aerated continuously by an oxygen pump and kept at the requisite temperature by an apparatus much like an incubator.

Turks Reinforced.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—According to a dispatch from Constantinople, sufficient Turkish reinforcements have now reached the front to enable the Turkish commanders-in-chief to assume the offensive. It is stated that three Turkish columns are moving toward the north and that these columns are known to be supported by other Turkish troops now being taken by water to Turkish ports of the Black Sea. Whether they will be in time to do any good is problematical.
