BOY SCOUTS' PLANS MADE

Organization is Perfected in Marshfield—Officers Chosen.

A very enthusiastic meeting of the Boy Scouts was held at the High school last Saturday evening. Nineteen boys came out to learn of the movement, which was explained to them by Herbert A. Busterud, who was formerly identified with the Boy Scouts of Crookston, Minn., in the capacity of scout master. He has kindly consented to act in a similar capacity in the movement here in conjunction with W. S. Turpin, Robert O. Graves and Rev. Robert E. Browning. All the boys present said they wanted to be scouts and the first regular meeting will be held tomorrow evening at 7:30 in the basement of the High school when the active work will begin. The Boy Scouts Manual, the official guide-book on scoutcraft, has been ordered and will be distributed among the boys when they arrive. There is need for some older boys who may be eligible for advanced work in scoutcraft and as possible scout-masters in the future.

In every community where the Boy Scouts are organized there is in connection with the same a local council, comprising men who have the interests of the boys at heart, and this council has charge of any local affairs of the Scouts. The meetings are held once a year, or on call if any important matter is to be decided. The following citizens of Marshfield have consented to act on this local board: Dr. E. Mingus, Dorsey Kreitzer, F. E. Allen, Bennett Swanton, A. B. Gidley, Supt. F. A. Tiedgen, R. O. Graves, and Robt. E. Browning. W. S. Turpin will be scout commissioner for this district and R. O. Graves will give special work to the boys in first aid to the injured.
