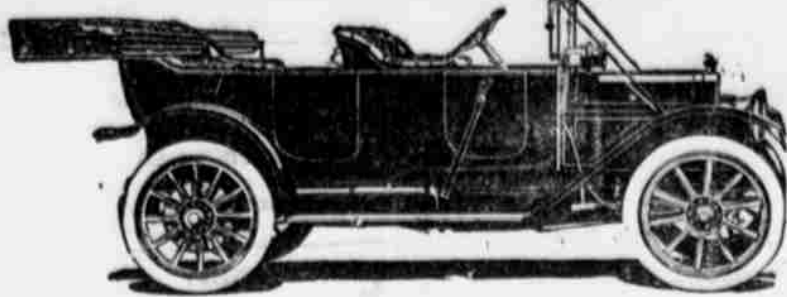

PARCELS POST.

The parcels post bill passed by the last Congress was its greatest work. It benefits the Oregon merchant and farmer. By it you send 11 pounds on any rural route for 15 cents; 11 pounds on any city route for 15 cents; 11 pounds to any customer within 50 miles of your store for 35 cents; 11 pounds to any customer between 50 and 100 miles of your store or home for 46 cents. But 11 pounds from Chicago and other mail-order cities will cost not less than \$1.32.
Senator Bourne is entitled to the credit for the construction and authorship of this bill, which goes into effect January 1, 1913. Had Bourne neglected this bill in April (primary time), it could not have become a law. He stuck to his post regardless of personal danger.

CITIZENSHIP.

Bourne has lived in Oregon 54 years. He owns large interests in several counties. He is a strong supporter of the Oregon System, having assisted in its formation. His speech on popular government was issued to 2,700,000 readers at his own expense, and he has advertised the state throughout the world.

NOT AGREED ON INTERVENTION

European Powers Undecided About Mixing in Balkan-Turkish Trouble.

BERLIN, Nov. 1.—The European governments have not yet agreed whether to intervene in the Balkan war or to offer mediation at the present moment or after the expected battle at Tchatiaja, 35 miles from Constantinople.

ACROBAT WORRIES NEIGHBORS.

Youth Stands on His Head on Fire Escape 150 Feet in the Air.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1.—Standing on his head on the rail of the fire escape of the top story of a 13-story building 150 feet above the street level, resulted in landing Herbert Loucks, 19 years old, in jail just before dark last night.

The performance may have proved satisfactory otherwise to Loucks, but it nearly shattered the nerves of hundreds of spectators whose attention had been attracted to the spectacle of the youth pointing himself on his head with his hands grasping the thin rail. When he brum, Loucks released one hand and balanced himself on the other. When the police reached the roof Loucks calmly demanded to know what they were excited about. "Just testing my nerve," he said, and accompanied the police to the station.
