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WILSON IS CHOSEN PRESIDENT IN BIG LANDSLIDE.

EASTERN STATES ARE CLAIMED CERTAIN BY WILSON LEADERS

Returns So Far Give Him 291 Votes in Electoral College.

ROOSEVELT LIKELY CARRIES FOUR STATES

Returns from East Early in Evening Indicate a Democratic Victory.

ELECTORAL VOTE.

PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—The states where results were reasonably certain at 10 o'clock gave the following electoral vote: Wilson, 291; Roosevelt 29; Taft 8. The total vote in the electoral college is 531.

Woodrow Wilson is elected president of the United States by a great Democratic landslide. The returns from the east and south indicated early in the evening that Wilson was the winner. Although the western states have not completed the return, enough has been reported to leave no doubt.

RETURNS IN PORTLAND SLOW IN COMING IN

Roosevelt is Far in Lead and Bourne is Probably Ahead.

(By Associated Press.) PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—Returns from 27 precincts in Portland give Taft 111, Wilson 177, Roosevelt 152. For United States Senator, Senator Bourne, Independent, 101; Clark, Progressive, 21; Lane, Democrat 105; Paget, Prohibition, 19; Selling, Republican, 91. For Representative—Lafferty (Republican and Progressive, 148; Munley, 86. The same precincts give equal suffrage 56 votes for 48 against.

Partial Returns.

His Plurality in This State May Reach 15,000—May Get Washington. (Special to The Times.) ROSEBURG, Nov. 6.—Returns received here indicate that Roosevelt may carry Oregon by a plurality of 15,000. It is also thought that Roosevelt has carried Washington. Returns from Portland give Selling 97, Bourne 95 and Lane 32 for United States senator. At 1 o'clock this morning George M. Brown claimed a good lead in Douglas county over W. W. Cardwell for prosecuting attorney.

DEMOCRATS ELECT NEW YORK GOVERNOR

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Returns for governor from 1096 election districts out of 3093 in New York state outside of New York city give Hedges, Republican, 116,007; Sulzer, Democrat, 131,343; Straus, Progressive, 79,697. The same precincts in 1910 gave Stinson, Republican, 154,763; Dix, Democrat, 146,890.

BIG MAJORITY IN THE SOUTHERN STATES

FIRST COUNT FROM LIBBY

Tie on Woman Suffrage and Debs Carries Precinct For President.

Libby was the first precinct to finish counting. The vote was small, there being 12 votes cast for president. Libby had a majority of 1 for Debs over Roosevelt. The precinct went against the good roads measure, there being one for and two against. The question of woman suffrage commanded more attention. The vote was 5 to 5. Single tax in Libby was lost by a vote of 7 to 1. Gage got 8 votes for sheriff in Libby and Lund none, while Orr, Socialist, got 3. The details of the vote in Libby is given with the other local returns.

DEMOCRATS WILL NOT GIVE UP IN ILLINOIS.

May Yet Be Some Doubt as to Roosevelt Carrying That State. (By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—With 222 precincts heard from the indication at 8:15 p. m. are that Roosevelt will carry the state outside of Cook county by 100,000 plurality if the returns continue in the present ratio. Wilson's managers do not yet concede Illinois to Roosevelt, however.

CLOSE RACE IS ON IN CALIFORNIA

Scattering Returns Make Results Uncertain for Wilson or Roosevelt. (By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Scattering returns from all sections of California indicate a close race between Roosevelt and Wilson. The registrar of voters, Harry Zeman, estimates that Wilson will carry San Francisco by 20,000 plurality.

Assessor—Thrift 178, Hansen 72, Welling 40. Some precincts will not finish counting until tomorrow. Results in the county are as yet uncertain. As only a few of the precincts have counted out and but a small amount of the results in this city were obtainable at 2 a. m. the count will be very slow owing to the large ballot. From scattering returns it appears that Gage is strongly leading Lund for sheriff, especially in the Coquille valley, where he is running 3 to 1. Smith and Stemmler are running very close for state senator. Pierce and Meredith are running close in Coos for joint representative. Brown appears to have a big lead over Cardwell in this county for prosecuting attorney. Woman's suffrage will probably carry in Coos county. Single tax is probably defeated in the county, but state graduated tax may carry. Ben Selling will probably carry the county for state senator with Lane second. Hawley will carry the county easy for congress. Thrift is probably elected assessor. The Socialists will show a big gain in their vote. H. C. Diers appears to be polling a good vote for surveyor. It is doubtful which presidential candidate will carry the county.
