Is Bankrupt.—Art Blanchard, of the Oregon Power company, who has been conducting a livery business here, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. His liabilities amount to \$2792.20 and his assets consist of \$2946.62 in unsecured claims and \$697 in secured claims. A hearing of creditors will be held before Referee Schibrede Nov. 14.

### CAPT. COX WELL KNOWN.

Wealthy Land Owner of Lane County Is Dead.

Capt. W. A. Cox, who died suddenly at Florence was one of the prominent men of that place. He was the son of a Nova Scotia shipbuilder and was born in 1831. His early life was spent sailing the Great Lakes, at which occupation he gained the title of captain. From the lakes he moved west, locating in California, during the year 1875. He at once entered into the seafaring life on the Pacific coast as captain of a coaster and soon became the owner of a ship.

He was one of the first navigators to enter the Siuslaw river. During a later trip his ship broke anchor near the mouth of the river and drifted to a watery grave on the Siuslaw bar with her entire crew, which included two of his sons. Captain Cox happened to be ashore at the time doing some trading and escaped.

During the year 1875 he moved with his family to Acme, on the Siuslaw. He at once took the initiative on all matters that were for the welfare of the country and was soon its most enterprising citizen. He gave the land for the first two mill sites on the Siuslaw river. During the early 80s he moved to Florence which has ever since been his home.

Captain Cox was one of the wealthiest land owners in Lane county, owning several thousand acres of farm and timber land on the Siuslaw, besides a great portion of both Acme and Florence.
