**BLACKMAIL.**

HERE is an industry known as blackmail, and not highly esteemed. In fact, it is rated as one of the meanest and certainly about the most cowardly form of crime.

It is practiced often upon respectable citizens in whose lives there has been some chapter not pleasing to memory—a chapter involving disgrace, or discomfort, or sorrow.

There is none who has not gone through some experience, which, although devoid of evil, and no reflection on the individual character, it would be embarrassing to have heralded from the housetops. In such case, those who have knowledge, and who are themselves decent, grant the boon of silence. On the contrary, the opportunity awakens the malevolence of the blackmailer, or the person morally akin to this wretched and degenerate type, and gloatingly he spreads abroad the information. "Ghoul-like glee" for once becomes no mere figure.

The only person who, being aware of another's indiscretion or misfortune, would possess the right to tell about it, would be one of unerring judgment, spotless career, pure soul, high purpose. And such an one would be of exactly the class that would guard the secret. To impute sinister motives is, of course, unkind, yet when there has been a gratuitous exposure that could have had no excuse except intrinsic malice, the conclusion that the act sprang from baseness is inevitable.

It is not always to be supposed that the life of such traducer is without reproach. Naturally, the observer asks: What has been the record of the Pharisee? Is he kind? Is he good? Do children like him? Is he honorable? As a publicist has he stood for the weak and oppressed, or has he been an oppressor? Have his years of activity been crowned with peace and respect? As he walks among men is their impulse to applaud or to hiss?

Blackmailing is a dangerous business and doing things that savor of blackmail is apt to bring ignoble reward.

### DEMOCATS TO CONTROL ALL

12 votes, those of Vermont, Idaho and Utah.

Pennsylvania's 38 votes are apparently certain for Roosevelt. The race between Taft, Roosevelt and Wilson was almost an even affair until more than 185,000 ballots were counted. As the precincts outside of the larger cities began to report, Roosevelt and Wilson forged ahead and with something like over half the vote counted, Roosevelt had a majority of over 20,000 in Minnesota, which had been conceded to Wilson at midnight Tuesday.

Returns from New Hampshire are so close as to make the predictions on these impossible. Taft's lead over Wilson varied from 13 to something over 400 and with many districts yet to be counted.

A division of the republican vote between Taft and Roosevelt gave Democratic victory in many states. In New York, the democrats carried the state ticket and legislature.

In Illinois the democratic candidate for governor apparently carried the state.

Democratic senators appeared certain as successors to republicans in Colorado, New Jersey, Delaware, Montana and several other states.

There was a general increase in the vote polled by Debs, the Socialist presidential candidate, but it was accompanied by setbacks to local socialist strongholds. In Wisconsin, Congressman Berger, the only socialist in the House, was defeated with a number of other officeholders. President-elect Wilson will have behind him a greatly strengthened majority in the House of Representatives and on early returns the democrats apparently have a chance to secure control of the senate.

**WASHINGTON PROGRESSIVE.**

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 7.—Returns received today do not change the position of Roosevelt and Hester to their beaten competitors. Interest has now shifted to the five congressional seats. The Progressive candidates at large for state senator, Senator Falconer of Everett and City Attorney J. W. Bryan of Bremerton, maintain their lead. In the first district, Representative Humphrey has the lead over Helfner, Democrat and Landon.
