Heavy Mud and Land Slides Makes Overland Travel Difficult.

MAIL ARRIVES.

The mail arrived at about noon today. Four trees had been blown down and across the road, causing the delay.

The old familiar sign "The mail has not arrived" was hanging up in the post office this morning. It was not known when the mail would get in as places along the route could not be reached by telephone. This morning no word had been received of the incoming mail at Sumner.

The delay is of course due to the bad condition of the roads. Several days ago there was a slide and the stage was delayed twelve hours. Since then the rainfall has been great and the roads are heavy with mud and the embankments have been sliding down and making obstructions.

With the high winds of last night, it is quite probable that trees were blown down over the road. It was hoped that the mail would get in some time this evening but there is no way of knowing when to expect it until it reaches Sumner.
