## HERE'S A TALE OF HARD LUCK

WINNING TICKET BURNS.

Lucky Man at San Francisco Finds Himself Unlucky.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—Ten thousand dollars, claimed in prospect by John Blum of 917 Twelfth Street, Oakland, went up in smoke. It was not real money, but a lottery ticket which Blum claimed had won a capital prize, which was burned through the action of Chief of Police Walter J. Petersen.

Blum was arrested on Saturday for selling lottery tickets. He came up before Police Judge Mortimer Smith. He made such a strong plea for mercy that Judge Smith placed him on probation for six months.

The lottery tickets were turned over to Chief Petersen. As soon as Blum left the courtroom he hurried to Petersen's office.

"I'm on probation, Chief," he said, "and I'll take those lottery tickets."

"I have burned them, according to law," said Petersen.

"Holy mackerel!" shouted Blum. "One of them has just won the capital prize of \$10,000."

"I don't care if it was worth a million," replied Petersen. "The law says to burn lottery tickets, and I did so."

Blum left mourning the fortune he had lost.

## OPPORTUNITY FIELD IS BIG

Immense Acreage in Oregon Awaits Development.

In a recent issue of the St. Paul Pioneer Press there appeared an interesting article on the land possibilities of Oregon, as follows:

rivers run swift with the clear, cold water of the hills. Her fields bask in sunshine and the winds from the snow-capped mountains add a zest to life. Physically the state is attractive, geographically its location is excellent, climatically it leaves nothing to be desired.

"This region has awaited that pressure of population which would bring men to cultivate its fields, develop its resources and build its cities. Recently it has been very prominent in the public eye by reason of the rapid extension of railway lines into the interior of Central Oregon. The many desirable features of the state have attracted the best class of settlers and they have given a vigorous and enterprising character to it. Its development will no doubt proceed much more rapidly than heretofore—hence the necessity for prompt action by the homeseeker who is thinking of Oregon.

"The supply of land in general is fixed, while the population is ever increasing. Our lands have been taken up by the homeseeker in an increasing ratio until today one cannot, as one could a decade ago, place one's finger almost anywhere upon a map of the west and say 'here lies a chance for me.' The matter of location is a problem—a different problem from what it has been. Where formerly it was a question of 'which is the best location?' today it is a question of 'what is there left?' And as the answer to this question Oregon comes to the front with her fertile fields and valleys, her grand forests, her rich minerals and her products of the river and sea, and beckons irresistibly.

"You certainly can make no mistake to come and spy out the land. Surely in the great variety which Oregon has to offer you can find some place to fit your need. Stand on the heights of Portland and drink in inspiration as you gaze upon Mount Hood, Mount St. Helens, Mount Rainier and Mount Adams, the ice-white sentinel peaks of the Cascades. Ride through the beautiful Willamette Valley with its varied scenery and prosperous towns and villages; visit the Hood River, Umpqua and Rogue River Valleys with their perfect orchards. Then hie you into the recently opened central Oregon country, where there is a vast acreage of virgin land to be obtained at very low prices, with a climate dry, balmy and exhilarating."

### BRIDGE CHURCH DAMAGED.

Word was received here Wednesday to the effect that the new Christian church at Bridge received considerable damage from the heavy wind last week. The wind blew down the doors and twisted the building nearly two feet from its foundation. The church was dedicated late this fall and cost between \$500 and \$600 cash, the work being donated by the members and friends of the church at that place. Just how much the actual damage to the building will amount to has not yet been ascertained.—Coquille Sentinel.
