

COOS BAY TIMES WANTS THE S. P. GRADES GIVEN

North Bend Council Sends the Railroad Notice—Bond Proposition.

At the meeting of the city council of North Bend held Tuesday night, Recorder Derbyshire was instructed to notify the Southern Pacific regarding street improvements which are being made in North Bend. The railroad company has been informed that streets are to be improved on which the railroad has rights of way and the city wants to know what grades are required by the railroad before the street work is done. The recorder was also instructed to state to the railroad that the city council and the people of North Bend were anxious that the company as soon as possible extend to North Bend the tracks of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern road.

The council appointed J. W. Grout, Peter Loggie and Archie Phillips election judges for the city election December 10. John Mullen, C. E. Maybee and C. A. Nowlin were named as clerks.

The council fixed November 29 as the date for holding the city caucus. It will be held at 8 p. m. in the gymnasium building.

To Plank Street.
The city engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for planking Washington street from Sherman to Staunton.

The Oregon Transportation Co. applied for permission to build an oil warehouse at the dock on Plat B. The city ordinance now in force provides that all oil within the city limits must be stored underground. However, in this case the building will be permitted but the city attorney was instructed to change the boundaries in the ordinance so that the transportation company can legally build the structure of the nature they desire.

The city recorder was instructed to notify the Oregon Power Co. to put in new electric lights which have been ordered and also to turn on the lights in the city at dark, it being complained that the lights are not turned on until about an hour after darkness falls.

Bond Proposition.
A bonding house made a proposition to the city regarding the floating of a \$25,000 bond issue. The city proposes to raise money in this manner to take up outstanding warrant indebtedness.

The bonding house proposes to make bids for the bonds if it is allowed to do all the preliminary work. In case that their bid is not accepted and the bonds are sold to some other house they are to be paid \$250 by the city for the preliminary work which they do. The bonding company also asks that if their lawyer finds that the city cannot properly sell bonds they are to be paid \$150 for their trouble. The city recorder was notified to tell the company that if the \$150 clause be cut out the city was ready to accept the rest of the offer. If the bonds are bought by some other company the city is willing to pay the bonding house the \$250 for the preliminary work.

on the city of San Diego (Cal.) plan. That is, the city to buy its distributing system and sell water to its patrons at a slight increase over the purchase price of the city. I will add further, so that it may be fully understood, San Diego's water supply is piped 60 miles. The city pays four cents per 1000 gallons. There is hardly a dollar invested outside of its distributing system. The city furnishes water for domestic use at from 8 to 10 cents per 1000 gallons. These items and conditions compare well with Marshfield. If Marshfield has her own distributing system it would also give her the number of hydrants necessary without question. The idea of paying a monthly rental of \$5 for each hydrant is out of the question; nothing but absolute meter rates should be considered. In closing, I will say that I believe The Times is right and that right will win, regardless of mushroom dailies coming into existence wishing to turn public sentiment with sugar coated writings on the subject of franchise.

Most of Marshfield's old players will be used but several of them have not qualified in their studies and will not be able to play.
