WOMEN VOTE CITY ELECTION

Speculation About City Election—Council Contests on Water Platform.

WINKLER MAY RUN.

Friends of Harry Winkler, the well known pharmacist at the Busy Corner, are urging him to become a candidate for the Marshfield city council. Owing to the number that have spoken to him, he has consented to take the matter under consideration.

WOMEN TO REGISTER

Mrs. A. H. Stutsman this morning appeared before City Recorder Butler and asked to register for the coming city election. He would not register her until he could consult the city attorney as to the legality of it. She says that she will appear daily until she is accorded the right of franchise.

Attorney General Crawford holds that suffrage is in force now and does not have to wait for Governor West's proclamation.

The prospect of women being able to participate in the Marshfield city election December 9 is causing considerable discussion and may add zest to the election. If Governor West has the proclamation announcing suffrage in Oregon issued before December 1, as was told in a Portland dispatch, women will be able to vote in Marshfield. However, they will be handicapped as the registration of voters will close Friday, November 18, and those who have not registered before that date will have to have their votes sworn in. This is a trifle bothersome.

Who Will Be Candidates.

Only four days remain in which candidates for councilmen and city recorder can file their nominating petitions and get their names printed on the ballot, the time expiring for this on November 18, the same date the time limit for registering for the city election expires.

So far as known, City Recorder Butler, who will be a candidate for re-election is the only one for whom nominating petitions are in the field. John C. Kendall is preparing yesterday to start Mr. Butler's petitions.

It is expected that whatever contest there is for the seats on the council will be made on the question of waterworks franchise. A. J. Savage, one of the councilmen whose term expires, is expected to be a candidate for re-election. Opponents of granting a long term franchise to the Coos Bay Water Company are talking against his candidacy, because of his statement at a recent meeting of the council that he favored granting a "liberal franchise to the old company."

C. O. Langworthy, John Bear and Tom Coke were among the names of the possible candidates mentioned this morning, in addition to those whose names were printed in yesterday's Times.
