More Road Trouble—Frank Hodson today had Herbert Geddes arrested again for trespass. Justice Pennock fixed next Monday as the date of Geddes' hearing. It is an echo of the Coos River road trouble, Hodson having Geddes arrested a week or so ago.

Take Degree—L. D. Brown the Southern Pacific engineer in charge of the tunnel work near Gardiner, and Louis C. Zoerner, chief steward on the Breakwater, took the Knights of Malta degree here last night, there being a large turnout for the event.

Gets Verdict—Yesterday afternoon Judge Coke awarded Charley Gee a North Bend Chinaman, a verdict for \$744 against Jay Wilcox for back salary. A number of witnesses were heard. R. O. Graves represented Gee and A. H. Derbyshire represented Wilcox.

Attach Goods—The Coos Bay Paving Company yesterday attached some of the equipment of the Federal Construction Company, which was being shipped on the Homer, to secure a claim of \$400 which they hold. Supt. Melvin had the attachment removed by furnishing bond.

Gets New Auto—George Goodrum on the Breakwater has received a new 1913 Ford touring car, the first of its kind to reach Coos Bay. It is a handsome machine. It is a five passenger machine with 22½ horse power engine machine with 22½ h. p. engine. Mr. Goodrum got it for a demonstrating car.

Captain On Visit—Capt. Harvey Russell of the launch Tioga and wife of North Bend will leave on the Redondo to visit with Mr. Russell's people in Tulare county, California. Capt. E. George Smith will have charge of the Tioga during Capt. Russell's absence and he and Mrs. Smith will live in North Bend while in charge.

For Elks' Show—J. W. Hildenbrand of the Marshfield Elks' lodge, received a telegram from Rufus K. Love, who is to put on the Elks' big show here, saying he and Mrs. Love would leave San Diego today for Coos Bay. About 60 people will take part in the show, which will be given at the Masonic theater the first week in December.

Driving Piling—Chas. Noble now has about two-thirds of the piling driven for the Chandler Hotel annex and the new Chandler building. He is driving them about 40 feet. The Chandler building will be two stories, but will be strong enough to be built higher later. Mr. Chandler yesterday denied a rumor that he had about closed a deal for the property south of the site of his new building.

Finds Valise—Yesterday Marshal Carter found a valise that

had been robbed and hidden under the South Fourth street bridge, near Mill Slough. Some agates, a pair of scissors and some trinkets were left with the valise, which was ruined by the wet weather. About two months ago, a woman reported to Marshal Carter that her grip had been stolen from the waterfront and this supposed to be the one.

Born in China—News of the birth of a son on October 12, to Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Hendry, who live in China, was recently received by North Bend friends. Mrs. Hendry, formerly Miss Pearl Shearer, is a niece of Mrs. E. J. Ketting of this city and will be remembered as having visited in North Bend a few years ago. Mr. Hendry was also of North Bend. The new arrival is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Hendry.

To Take Evidence—Evidence in the case of Christian Herrmann vs. Judge Hall, Henry Sengstacken, L. D. Smith and others, over the sale of Eastside property by the Norman estate, will be taken before Miss Violet Henderson next Monday. Herrmann's attorneys are expected here from Portland to be present at the taking of the depositions which are preliminary to the trial in the federal court at Portland about December 15.

Relative Honored—The Albany Democrat reports that County Clerk Willard Marks was re-elected by a majority of 3835 over his opponent, the largest majority given any candidate in Linn county. This is Mr. Marks' second term and both times he had the nomination of the Democratic and Republican parties. He is the youngest clerk in Oregon and is a son-in-law of Mrs. Trewella Turner of the Hub Dry Goods Company.

For Coquille Postmaster—F. E. Cleghorn, a prominent Coquille business man, was in Marshfield today consulting with Hugh McLain and other prominent Democrats relative to his candidacy for the postmastership at Coquille. He is a Democrat and has long been engaged in business with P. E. Drane and his petition for the place is signed by nearly every prominent man in Coquille. Postmaster Fred Linegar's appointment will not expire for sometime but Mr. Cleghorn wants to get in the game early.

Finds Coal—Several Marshfield people are elated over a report that Geologist Bailey, an inspector of the United States Department of Agriculture, has found on inspection that the Eden Valley country is more valuable for coal than timber. Herbert Lockhart and wife, J. H. Flanagan, S. D. Pulford and Cecil Carter, the latter of Myrtle Point, took coal claims there and they were rejected on the ground that the timber was more valuable for timber than coal. They appealed and now hope to win out. Mr. Bailey is said to have reported that there is an 11-foot vein of coal there.
