TIMES concludes Mayor Ford's Interesting HE contribution to the waterworks discussion in this issue. showing made will be helpful to Coos Bay people in giving them definite and accurate information as to rates, profits and ser-vice of city water works systems in all sections of the country. Especially illuminating is Mayor Ford's concluding paragraphs in which he makes a comparison between the municipal owned plant in

Sloux City, lowa, and the privately owned plant in Des Moines, lowa. In Sloux City, where the people own the water works, they derive a profit of \$70,000 per year, in addition to furnishing free water for hydrauts, for street flushing, free water for five hospitals, city schools and all orbinances and charitable institutions. While in Des Moines it costs the taxpayers \$60,000 for hydrants and city water, and in addition the people of Des Moines pay as high as \$20,00 per year for water, while in Sloux City the ordinary S- or 10-room house seldom, if ever, costs more than \$8 or \$10 a year. Mayor Ford shows conclusively that if Des Molnes had started 20 years ago and spent only the money they have paid the water company for service in that time they would have their plant paid for now and saved the people thousands of dollars, whereas at present the company is demand-ing \$2,000,000 for their plant.
