

NEW HOLIDAY IS PROCLAIMED

Governor West Names Day to Be Observed as Home Industries Day.

Governor Oswald West has issued his proclamation declaring November 21 to be Home Industries Day. The purpose is to further the demand for Oregon-made products. The proclamation follows:

Whereas, The growth and prosperity of a state depend to a great extent upon its manufacturing industries for the reason that the factory converts the raw material of the forest and stream and farm and mine into products of higher value, giving employment to thousands who would otherwise have no means of livelihood.

Whereas, It is only by arousing the people to the importance of creating and patronizing home industries that we can hope for success along these lines;

Therefore, In view of the foregoing premises, I, Oswald West, Governor, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim Thursday, November 21, 1912, as Home Industries Day.

To make this day an impressive object lesson to the whole state there should be some concerted action toward increasing the demand for Oregon-made products. To this end I would suggest that every manufacturing establishment in the state close down for an hour during Home Industries Day and the managers call their employees together and give them a heart-to-heart talk on the importance of building up our home industries and set an example by declaring their intention to use, as far as practicable, only home-grown products and home-made machinery in their establishments.

I would suggest also that on Home Industries Day every man and woman in Oregon in doing their shopping, purchase only made-

in-Oregon products. Merchants should help by making attractive window displays of such products. I would also suggest that the subject be discussed in our public schools and institutions of learning, in order that it may be impressed upon the mind of the young, for the time will come when these same children must have employment, and unless they can find it with the industries of our state they must seek it in other states. Success along these lines can only come through the hearty co-operation of all good citizens, and I bespeak for the cause such co-operation.

SPENDING LARGE SUMS.

Enormous Amount Will Be Used for the Exposition. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—Rodney S. Darke, comptroller of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, in his statement of the income, expenditures and subscription accounts for the entire period from the commencement of business in December, 1909, to September 30, 1912, states that \$305,166.62 was used for the purchase of real estate, and that the buildings and grounds department has expended \$340,342.23, which is an indication of its activity. This outlay covers architectural and engineering expenses, and the cost of filling in the overflow lands on the Exposition site.

The subscription accounts show total signed subscriptions of \$6,095,350 and unsigned subscriptions of 1,453,350, making a total of \$7,548,700.

"Of the unsigned subscriptions," says Comptroller Darke, "there has been paid \$2,325,801.29, or 38.16 per cent of the total. Inasmuch as but 40 per cent of the total has been called for at the time of this statement, I consider the proportions of collections very remarkable.

STAGE ROBBER STAYS IN JAIL

Efforts to Release Man Who Held Up Drain Stage Fruitless.

SALEM, Nov. 16.—In the circuit court Judge Galloway decided that one Frank Foster, in whose behalf habeas corpus proceedings were instituted must be remanded to the penitentiary. Foster pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny from the person and was committed to the state prison from Douglas county. He was given an indeterminate sentence which was said to be illegal in that no specified number of years was set. The judge passing sentence on Foster said he would sentence him to an indeterminate sentence as provided by law.

Attorney General Crawford appeared for the state and produced a law which is to the effect that upon a plea of guilty the prisoner is to be remanded to the officer from whom he is received. Accordingly Foster was sent back to the state prison. It is possible that an appeal from the decision will be taken. Foster's indeterminate sentence extends from 10 years to life imprisonment.

Foster is one of the two young men who held up the Drain stage a year ago and robbed the driver and passengers, one of whom was C. E. Ricker, foreman of the grand jury. Several days later Foster and his partner, Jurgens by name, were arrested at the latter's home on South Deer creek, east of Roseburg.

REACH AGREEMENT.

Russia and United States Arrange New Treaty. It was declared probable, however, that the details will be worked out satisfactorily to both countries before the old treaty expires.
