### OPEN LETTER TO THE PEOPLE

Editor Coos Bay Times:  
There is something amusing about the opinion of the average business and professional men of our great city of Marshfield. According to a statement made by some of their kind that they would be willing to become Socialists and join the party, providing that they would not come in contact, or have to deal in any manner with a certain class of workingmen, who at the present time are members of the Socialist party. They even suggested to form a separate Socialist local in this city, composed of business and professional men only. In my opinion it would be a party alright, of what? A Socialist party with capitalistic ideas because the average business man dreams of becoming a millionaire some day. Before going into details on this subject, I would advise those business or professional men who assume the responsibility of such a statement to study the doctrines of socialism and its principles, also the application of such to the present stage of society. The Socialist party recognizes only two classes in society—the one the working class, the one the capitalist class, or, in other words, those who produce everything and have nothing, or those who produce nothing and have everything. The class conscious workingmen who are members of the Socialist party have to realize that what is done for them must be done by themselves. In this particular instance I wish to call your attention to the fact that the class conscious workingmen do not join the party for a political office or some other political position, but simply for the need of solidarity, economical and political. We don't solicit the assistance of any business or professional man until he becomes class conscious, and realizes that under the present profit system, it is only a matter of a short time that he will be forced to the wall by the trust and join the great army of "out of business or the unemployed," as you may call it. To prove my statement in this matter, I confront the small business man who has a few thousand dollars invested with a great department store who has several millions invested, as the situation is in the larger cities. Then comes the co-operative store, which has taken root in most of the cities of the eastern states, and has a strong foothold in all the European countries to the ruin of the small business man, because the profits derived from such stores are divided amongst their own customers. There is even a movement under consideration by the Socialists of Coos county who have shown their strength in the last election, to establish a co-operative store in every city in this county. The small business man stands in the same position as the average workman—d I am willing to devote

# NEW GOVERNORS FOR MANY STATES

Many changes among the chief executives of the different states will take place next January as a result of the recent elections. Of the twenty-eight states that balloted for governors only nine reelected their present executives. The governors fortunate enough to be elected for another term are Simeon E. Baldwin, Democrat, of Connecticut; Eugene N. Foss, Democrat, of Massachusetts; Adolph O. Eberhart, Republican, of Minnesota; Coleman L. Blease, Democrat, of South Carolina; Ben W. Hooper, Republican-fusion, of Tennessee; Oscar B. Colquit, Democrat, of Texas; William Spry, Republican, of Utah; Francis B. McGovern, Republican, of Wisconsin; and Aram J. Pothier, Republican of Rhode Island. Of the new governors twelve are Democrats and eight are Republicans. Elias M. Ammons, Democrat, succeeds Governor Shafroth, Democrat, in Colorado. Charles R. Miller, a prominent citizen of Wilmington, succeeds Governor Pennell of Delaware. Both are Republicans. Park Trammell, at present attorney-general of Florida, will become governor in succession to Albert M. Gilchrist. Both are Democrats. John M. Haines, Republican will succeed James H. Hawley, Democrat, as governor of Idaho. Edward P. Dunne, former mayor of Chicago, has been elected by the Democrats of Illinois to succeed Governor Deneen, Republican. Governor Marshall of Indiana, who will be vice-president of the United States after March 4, will be succeeded by another Democrat, Samuel M. Ralston of Lebanon. In Iowa, Governor Carroll, Republican, will be succeeded by George W. Clarke, also a Republican. Mr. Clarke is at present lieutenant-governor. The state of Michigan followed the lead of the nation by electing a "schoolmaster" to the office of chief executive. Woodbridge N. Ferris, Democrat, who will succeed Governor Osborn, Republican, has devoted his life to educational work. some more time and paper to convince him of his position, as the Socialists are not dreamers and any statement they make is based upon facts and quoted from government statistics.
