

ESTABROOK COME TO BAY

Steamship Man and Lumber Broker to Visit Here-Makes Contract.

A. F. Estabrook of the Estabrook Steamship Company, is expected here the last of the week from San Francisco, making the initial trip with the Steamer Speedwell, under Capt. Burtis, the former master of the M. F. Plani. Mr. Estabrook will probably make more definite ar-rangements about the service out of here by his company in the future.
