TURKEY TURNS DOWN OFFER OF PEACE MADE BY BALKANS

Announces That Conditions Cannot Be Conceded by Ottoman Empire.

MAND THAT THREE CITIES BE GIVEN UP.

Commander-in-Chief Instructed to Renew Hostilities.

TURKEY REJECTS OFFER.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 21.—The Ottoman government has rejected the terms offered by the allied Balkan nations. Nizam Pasha, the Turkish commander, has been ordered to resume operations.

The official announcement says, "The Porte finding the Balkan terms for an armistice unacceptable, has ordered Nizam Pasha to resume his military operations."

ULTIMATUM BY FRANCE.

The Turkey That Christians Must Be Protected. PARIS, Nov. 21.—France notified Turkish government today that would hold Turkey responsible for violence against Christians and asked the adoption of rigid measures to prevent any outbreaks.

GREEKS ARE ACTIVE.

Turkish Outpost South of Monastir. ATHENS, Nov. 21.—The Greek army have occupied the Turkish post of Florina, to the south of Monastir, and cut off the rear of the Turkish army retreat from Monastir after its capture by the Servians.

U. S. BOATS ENROUTE.

U. S. Cruisers Reach Gibraltar Today. BALTIC, Nov. 21.—The United States cruisers Tennessee and Monaghan arrived here this afternoon. They are coaling preparatory to proceeding to Turkish waters for the protection of American citizens in Ottoman empire.

BULGARIANS CLAIM SEA VICTORY

That Bulgarian Torpedo Boats Were Sunk and Captured.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 21.—In the Black Sea this morning two Bulgarian torpedo boats were sunk and two others badly shattered. Hamidieh is said to have escaped practically no damage.

BALKAN TERMS TO TURKS EASY

Overtures to End War Not Unreasonable—Cruelties of Servians Reported.

VIENNA, Nov. 21.—The terms offered Turkey by the Balkan allies are not in form uncompromising, according to information derived from an authoritative source in Sofia. They even leave the door open to eventual modifications by negotiations so it may be assumed that Turkey will accept them and a truce will be brought about.

The Reichpost sent instructions to Lieutenant Wagner, its correspondent, to proceed to Pristina, but the Servian government prevented him from going. While at Nish, Wagner reports he heard well nigh incredible details of barbarities committed by the Servian troops on the Albanians.

TO AID IN NEGOTIATIONS.

Turkish Diplomat Is Called Home From Germany.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—Osman Nizam Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to Germany, was ordered to Constantinople today to assist in the peace negotiations.

SAYS BULGARS ARE RETIRING

Turks Report That Opponents Are Abandoning Trenches Held for Three Days.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 21.—Nizam Pasha, the Turkish commander, in a message to the war office, says the Turkish reconnoitering parties confirm the reports that the Bulgarians have abandoned the trenches they held during the last three days. He says the enemy has fallen back to certain points as much as four and a half miles from the Turkish lines.

REPORT CRUISER SUNK.

Bulgarian Torpedo Boats Reported to Have Accomplished Feat. SOFIA, Nov. 21.—The Turkish cruiser Hamidieh is reported to have been blown up by the Bulgarian torpedo boats near the port of Varna, on the Black Sea. No confirmation has been received by the war office.

VIEWS OF EMPEROR.

Franz Joseph Commends Bulgarian Troops.

VIENNA, Nov. 21.—At a banquet last evening, Emperor Franz Joseph expressed admiration of the way the Bulgarian troops had behaved during the war. On the other hand, his majesty declared he could not understand why the fortunes of war were so unfavorable to the Turks.

WANT THREE CITIES.

Turks Say They Cannot Grant Demands of Balkans.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Bulgarian terms of peace are impossible, according to the Turkish grand vizier, and if insisted on, the war will continue. He made this statement to a correspondent of the Daily Mail today at Constantinople. He said the Bulgarians demanded the surrender of Adrianople, Scutaria, and Tehalatja.

LARGE NUMBER UNDER ARREST

Government Has 142 in Custody in Its Anti "Race Suicide" Campaign—More to Be Arrested.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—One hundred and forty-two persons, comprising nine-nine men and forty-three

women, have been arrested in the government's anti-"race suicide" crusade according to a compilation made today of figures reported to the inspectors of the post office department. Forty-two business concerns were included in the report. The total roundup will exceed probably the total of 173 fixed yesterday by the inspectors.

100 DIE IN EARTH QUAKE

Town of Acanbay, Mexico, Is Reported Hard Hit by Recent Tremor.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.—A report that the town of Acanbay in the Northern part of the state of Mexico was destroyed by Tuesday's earthquake, was renewed today in El Toro and a number of doctors immediately proceeded to the scene. It was said the victims numbered 100.

TWELVE DIE IN REBEL BANDS

Mexican Federals Repulse Revolutionists and Kill Two Leaders.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 21.—In a battle near Madera, the federals under General Blanco, yesterday defeated two bands of rebels commanded by Terrazan and Ramos, killing twelve rebels, including both leaders, according to reports today.

REBELS ARE ACTIVE.

Report Capture of Mexican Town Opposite New Mexico.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 21.—The rebels, early today, took Palomas, the Mexican port of entry opposite Columbus, New Mexico, after two hours of brisk fighting, according to a report from Fort Bliss.

CROWN PRINCE ILL.

Help to Russian Throne Suffers From Tuberculosis.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—The Russian imperial crown prince is suffering from tuberculosis of the hip joint and hemophilia, excluding any hope of his complete recovery. His health, according to the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Vossische Zeitung, who says his information is from an absolutely authentic source.

NORTH BEND POLITICS.

Several Candidates Talked of For Election There.

H. C. Diers of North Bend, who was in Marshfield today, reports that considerable interest is being taken in the coming city election there. The caucus to nominate candidates will be held November 29, but already a number of candidates are being talked of. Major Kinney is expected to come out as a candidate for council, Herbert Armstrong for mayor and J. H. Greves for treasurer.

The North Bend Socialists are planning to nominate N. H. Wellington for mayor, Edward Coffelt for treasurer and C. S. Kaiser for councilman.

Councilmen Bartle, Falkenstein and Kern, whose terms expire, are expected to be candidates for re-election. An endeavor is being made to prevent too many coming out for council by those who are opposed to the Socialists. The Socialists polled a big vote in the November election and claim they will win.

Mayor Simpson is expected to be a candidate for re-election.

APPEALS FOR LABOR LEADERS

Trials of Men Charged With Murder During Textile Strike Nearly Done.

SALEM, Mass., Nov. 21.—Appealing for a verdict of acquittal for Joseph J. Etter and the co-defendants on the broad ground that their conviction would be a blow at the right of assembly and free speech, Attorney Mahoney closed his argument to the jury today in the trial of Etter, Giovannianni and Caruso in connection with the murder of Anna Lopizzo, during the textile workers' strike.

SEND MEN TO WASHINGTON

Steps to Be Taken Soon to Send Delegation There for Appropriation.

It is likely that steps will be taken in a day or two by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce and the Port of Coos Bay Commission to send a delegation to Washington to urge upon Congress and the United States engineers the necessity of improving the Coos Bay harbor and bar.

It was proposed some weeks ago to send a delegation of seven or more. Then Capt. Macgenn, Arno Meehan or C. A. Smith, Dr. Mingus, Hugh McLain, Edgar Elmpson or L. J. Simpson, Peter Loggie and J. W. Bennett were suggested as the committee to go.

Capt. Macgenn thinks that the sending of a committee to Washington now is most essential because there is danger of the new survey of the bar and harbor, ordered by General Bixby, may not be completed to submit to congress early.

Passengers on the Alliance who were kept outside 36 hours by the rough bar yesterday and last night are talking of sending a petition to the United States engineers reciting their experience.

Capt. Robert in charge of the United States engineering office at Portland and Capt. Polhemus are now busy on the preliminary survey matter.

WARRANT FOR McALLISTER

Formal Charge Made Against Attorney in Portland

A Portland paper has the following to say concerning E. S. J. McAllister, the Portland attorney, who left here yesterday to face the charges preferred against him:

"A formal complaint against Attorney E. S. J. McAllister in connection with the crusade now being waged by the Juvenile Court authorities against persons accused of degenerate practices, was sworn to before Deputy County Clerk Reed at noon today. McAllister has been in Marshfield since last Friday to take testimony in a case in which he is interested as counsel. Following the signing of the complaint this noon, Deputy District Attorney Collier stated that he would inform McAllister's law partner and request that McAllister be notified to come to Portland at once. He has not decided to secure the attorney's arrest by the Marshfield authorities, and probably will not take this step unless he becomes convinced that this course is necessary to secure McAllister's presence here to answer the charge preferred against him."

UNION SPENT MONEY FREELY

No Accounting of "Dynamite Funds" According to Iron Worker Leader.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 21.—Parts of infernal machines found in wrecks of bridges and buildings in various cities were exhibited at the dynamite conspiracy trial here today. Henry W. Legleitner, member of the Iron worker's Executive Board when arrested last winter admitted that the union officials expended money without giving an accounting, according to Samuel A. Meyers. Meyers testified that he asked Legleitner about \$1,000 a month, which the government charges was used by McNamara for dynamiting. Meyer said Legleitner told him the "inner circle of officials" controlled the finances and also that President Ryan had authority to pay out money when the executive board was not in session.

CHINA WANTS MANCHURIA

New Celestial Republic Plans to Go to War With Russia to Recover Province.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Cablegrams received from China in the local Chinese quarter, announced that the republic is preparing to go to war with Russia for possession of Manchuria. Big secret associations which fostered the revolution have been exchanging dispatches with President Yuan Shi Kai. The Young China association has opened subscription lists and lecturers have spoken at every Chinatown corner explaining the encroachments of the Czar's troops.

ALLIANCE IN FROM PORTLAND

Capt. Lofstad Reports Unusually Rough Weather—Seas Mounted High.

The Alliance crossed in this morning from Portland, after spending thirty-six hours off the bar waiting for the sea to moderate sufficiently to allow her cross in. Capt. NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Sam Schepps, one of the four informers whose testimony resulted in the conviction of Charles Becker and the four gunmen in the Rosenthal murder case, was discharged from custody today. A crowd of 1500 watched the release of Rose, Webber and Vallon from the West Side prison this afternoon. Rose left in one auto, accompanied by his wife and Webber, accompanied by his wife, whirled away in another. Vallon slipped out by a side entrance and mingling with the crowd disappeared unrecognized except by a few.

JOHNSON GIVEN TIME.

Negro Pugilist Gets Three Weeks to Demur to White Slave Charge.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, was granted by Federal Judge Carpenter today three weeks in which to file demurrers to five charges against him for violation of the white slave law.

Johnson, who was represented by four attorneys, pleaded not guilty to the charge of smuggling a \$6000 necklace from Europe.
