**Chemistry.** In Chemistry, attention has been paid to the preparation and study of the compounds of nitrogen. Nitric acid was prepared by the commercial method, the oxides of nitrogen studied and several prepared and an extended study of ammonia was made, especially regarding preparation commercially, and its uses. The value of ammonia as affording a means for the manufacture of ice was discovered and the general form of the plant studied.

**Physics.** The students in Physics for the past week have been studying the cooling effect produced on evaporation, experimenting with ether, alcohol and gasoline. Capillary action was also studied and the capillary phenomena in every day life, such as the rising of oil in lamp wicks, the absorption of ink by blotting paper, etc., discussed.
