**VESSELS SAIL  
THIS MORNING**

**Storm Abates and Several  
Ships Go to Sea—Wash-  
ington to Return.**

After being harried by the rough weather, several vessels crossed out today. The Redondo, Nann Smith, Newberg and Alliance sailed for the south. The Breakwater sailed north. All crossed out between 10 and 10:50 o'clock.

The Homer arrived this morning from San Francisco with a cargo of general freight, the biggest shipment being about 200 tons of bitumen for the Coos Bay Paving and Construction Company's work at Myrtle Point. She will sail south Tuesday with freight only.

The Washington, which has been on drydock at Portland undergoing repairs is expected back here on Monday and will resume her run between San Francisco and Coos Bay.

The Speedwell, the new vessel of the Estabrook line, which is to ply between Coos Bay and Bandon and San Francisco, arrived in at Bandon this morning on her initial trip and is expected here tomorrow or Monday. The Piffeld sailed for San Francisco.
