

NORTH BEND TO ISSUE BONDS

Council Discusses Plan to Retire City Warrants—Talk of Election.

At a meeting of the North Bend city council, preliminary plans were discussed for floating a \$32,000 bond issue to retire the city's general expense warrants. These warrants total about that sum. It is expected that definite steps will be taken soon.

The council voted to improve Washington from Sherman to Stanton, two blocks, by grading and planking. It will cost about \$1,800.

The council received a petition from the North Bend Socialists asking that the city ordinance prohibiting public speaking on the streets be rescinded. The council postponed action on it, but may grant it next meeting, owing to the defeat of the state wide initiative measure at the November election and also to the large number of Socialists in North Bend who desire it.

The council also voted to resume the old wharfage charge on freight in and out over the city dock. This charge was taken off last summer when it was expected that active railroad construction would start soon. It was abolished as a special inducement to the contractors and the Southern Pacific to handle their stuff through North Bend. The inducement failed to hasten the work and the current business in and out over the wharf is wearing it considerable, requiring the expenditure of quite a sum by the city to keep it in repair. Also, the Washington recently unloaded a large amount of lumber on it, when she had to discharge her cargo to go to Portland for repairs, and this load will do between \$300 and \$400 damage to the wharf, it is estimated.

There was an informal discussion of North Bend politics before the regular business session. All the old city officials with the exception of Treasurer C. S. Winsor will be candidates for re-election. It is expected that Major Kinney will not enter the race for councilmen. This will probably result in two tickets in the field, the Socialists and the Citizens' tickets. J. H. Greves will be a candidate for treasurer in place of Mr. Winsor.
