GIFTS FOR THE FAIR MOTORIST.

Pretty Headgear and Bags Are Useful Christmas Presents.

Here is a hood easily made and dainty which will prove a useful gift for the feminine motorist, whether she is young or old. It is of cloth in brown and white mixture combined with plain white in basket weave cloth. The white is for the band along the front of the hood and for the flaring angular piece at the back. First Aid For Motorists,

A Beauty Bag.

The pretty bag shown here may be carried on the arm. It may be designed in colors to match the motoring garb. Old rose slik faced with green is used for the smart bag illustrated, The flowered part is cut out of a single round piece of silk. The edges are in deep points.

The bag is lined with pale green slik. A casing for a narrow ribbon of pale green to match the lining is run inside the bag. A star shaped section of green silk is stitched to the bottom of the bag, the ends of the tabs being caught to the sides of the bag and finished with tiny bows of ribbon.
