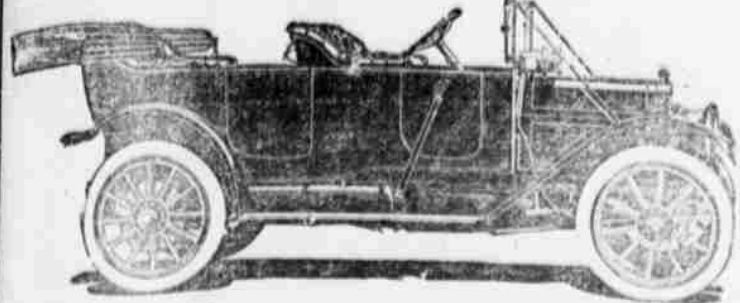

REAL FARMERS MUST BE BORN

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—"Ten days of doing 'chores' before breakfast will cure the average 'back-to-the-land' fever," said Benjamin O. Packer, United States commissioner of immigration, at the second annual meeting of the national conference of immigration, land and labor officials here today.

Mr. Packer asserted that there was much discussion in connection with country life.

"Those who have started and kept alive the poetic sentiment relative to the back-to-the-land movement," he said "are the ones who are most likely to find their ideas dashed to the ground by duties and conditions not considered before leaving their comfortable apartments.

"It is not the man unaccustomed to hard manual labor that the land departments of the various states want on their farms. The man who has come of generations of farmers in this country or other countries is the best to encourage in this work. He will get results where the others will fail."
