Piling Driven.—The last of the piling for the foundation of the new Chandler building and the Chandler Hotel annex were driven yesterday. Mr. Chandler is planning to go ahead with the building soon, but it is doubtful if the weather will permit him to do much this winter.

Morgan and a Portland syndicate, who have long been negotiating for his Millicoma coal mining property. They take it on a lease with an option to buy.
