

CONDITIONS OF CITY WATER

(Continued from Page 1.)

In many places, and throughout is insufficient in size to supply the population which it attempts to serve. That said system does not reach many of the houses and dwellings in well populated districts of said city at all and the pipes through which it reaches many of the dwellings in said city are so small and inadequate that it is impossible for the users thereof to secure sufficient water therefrom for domestic purposes.

Sixth. That the pressure in its mains within said city at the lowest point thereof never reaches 75 pounds per square inch, is usually maintained at about 40 pounds per square inch, and is often reduced to considerably less than 40 pounds per square inch; that said city of Marshfield is in large part on uneven and hilly ground and many of the residences in said city, which are connected with said water system are unable to obtain water therefrom except at irregular intervals and at times when other users thereof intermediate between them and the source of supply, are not using the same and that many buildings in said city are so situated that the water in said mains and pipes does not rise to their level at any time.

Seventh. That its system of water mains of sufficient size to afford any fire protection whatever, i. e., as large as four inches in diameter, or larger, does not extend to one-third the area of said city nor reach the residences of more than one-half its population; that many of the large residence districts of said city are reached only by pipes of two inches in diameter or under and that property within said city of at least \$700,000 in value is utterly without fire protection whatsoever. That for proper fire protection the pressure in said mains throughout the main portion of said city should be at all times maintained at at least 75 pounds per square inch, while the present pressure therein ranges from 40 pounds per square inch downwards to nearly zero.

Eighth. That by ordinance of the city of Marshfield, duly enacted on the 4th day of March, 1912, forty additional fire hydrants were ordered installed at specified places within said city where the same were required for the additional protection of adjacent property and the defendant was forthwith notified and required to lay such additional water mains as were necessary to reach said hydrants and was notified to have said mains installed by the first day of October, 1912, but it has utterly failed, neglected and refused so to do.

Fifth. That the plaintiff through its proper officers has repeatedly endeavored to secure better service from said defendant but said defendant has utterly failed, neglected and refused to remedy or improve the same.

Sixth. That the aforesaid service of defendant is in the respects complained of and by reason of the foregoing matters and things, inadequate, insufficient and unreasonable.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that the defendant be required to answer the charges herein and that after due hearing and investigation, an order be made commanding the defendant to cease and desist from its violation of the provisions of Chapter 53 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1907, as amended, herein complained of, and that said Commission shall order said defendant to furnish such service as it shall determine to be reasonable upon such terms and within such time as the Commission shall fix, and for such other and further order as the Commission may deem just and necessary in the premises.

TELLS ABOUT CITY ISSUES

Marshfield Booster Explains Why Bennett Wants Coke and Savage Elected.

Editor Times:

It seems to me that attention ought to be called to the reasons why J. W. Bennett and the Coos Bay Water company are doing everything in their power to have A. J. Savage and Tom Coke elected councilmen at the election tomorrow.

Everyone knows they are opposing Albrecht and Winkler because the latter stand for decent water service, municipal ownership of the water-works, and are opposed to granting the company a long term franchise at increased rates.

Besides the waterworks matter, Mr. Bennett is also figuring on the railroad situation. He wants some councilmen on there to protect his railroad franchise, for which he is reported to want \$100,000. Tom Coke, who is in the employ of his railroad, if elected to the council would naturally have to work for his company and would oppose any railroad seeking entrance to the city, even though the coming of the railroad would make Marshfield what we all want it to be—a good city. Savage would do the same for he is always liberal in the city matters, when it benefits Mr. Bennett.

Then Mr. Bennett's railroad company will be asking an extension of their franchise, so they won't have to spend so much money in actual railroad building, because Mr. Bennett doesn't want to put in very much money and thereby he will get more velvet when, if he is able, to force some railroad to pay liberally, \$100,000 or so, for the franchise which the city gave him.

Of course, Messrs. Coke and Savage wouldn't grant a franchise to any other railroad if it would spoil Mr. Bennett's chances of getting a fat, juicy price for his railroad franchise. Suppose the Hill line, or the Gould line want to come in here. Will they have to deal with the city of Marshfield for the benefit of the city, or will they have to negotiate with Mr. Bennett for his benefit?

A few of Bennett's henchmen have been trying to weaken Mr. Albrecht's popularity by claiming that he has opposed public improvements. Everybody who knows about Mr. Albrecht's record on the city council in the past knows that he favored improvements. However, he insists that the improvements be done in a business-like way and that the property owners get what they were assessed for and had to pay. He insisted that the contractors do good work and that it be done at reasonable prices. Note the difference in the price of some of the paving contracts whereby the property owners were saved money. Mr. Albrecht has had to work for his money and knows how most of the Marshfield people have had to work for theirs. He got his home by working hard and saving his money and he knows that every cent counts to the average working man. Consequently he insisted on the people getting their money's worth in improvements and some of the contractors and a few that the contractors have boosted into office have been kicking at him ever since.

There is just one thing for the voters of Marshfield to do at the polls tomorrow, and that is to vote for Albrecht and Winkler.

M'ALLISTER IS INDICTED.

Portland Lawyer Known in Marshfield Held for Heinous Offense.

A Portland paper says:

E. S. J. McAllister, attorney, and Harry A. Start, a practicing physician, were indicted by the grand jury Friday in connection with the crusade waged by the officers of the juvenile court, against persons accused of depraved habits. A batch of 13 indictments in all was handed in by the members of the grand jury. 11 defendants being mentioned, while in two cases charges were lodged against single individuals. Nine of the indictments have been released for publication, the remaining four being withheld until the accused persons are placed in custody.

In addition to the two defendants mentioned above, the list of those accused by the grand jury is as follows: H. L. Rowe, two indictments; E. E. Wedemeyer, two indictments; Earl Van Hulen, Earl Brown and John Doe Bosworth.

In the cases of McAllister and Start, bail has been fixed by Judge Morrow at \$1000 each, the latter's bonds being reduced from \$5000. Rowe and Wedemeyer will be required to give \$1500 bonds each and Van Hulen, Brown and Bosworth \$500 each.

Two classes of charges are brought against the defendants, one being designated as an immoral act, and the other "too well understood and too disgusting to be set forth." The latter charge is set forth on the indictments against McAllister and Start.

RECORDER SAYS STORY IS FALSE

Official Denial of Story Circulated by the Water Company.

The Water Company in its desperation is circulating stories to the effect that Carl Albrecht is opposed to all improvements and that today there is an unpaid assessment for improvements against his property in North Bend. The following statement from the recorder of North Bend proves the falseness of this story which is on a par with the other reckless misstatements being put in circulation to confuse and deceive the people:

North Bend, Dec. 2, 1912. I, A. H. Derbyshire, do hereby certify: That I am and ever since the ninth day of January, 1909, I have been the duly elected, qualified and acting Recorder of the City of North Bend, in the county of Coos, State of Oregon:

That as such officer I am the custodian of the records of said City of North Bend, including the "Special Assessment Roll and Docket of City Liens."

That there is not, nor has there been since the 10th day of February, 1911, upon the records of said city any unpaid assessment, due, owing or payable from Carl Albrecht of Marshfield, Oregon, to said City of North Bend.

COURT OPENS IN COQUILLE

Adjourned Term of Circuit Court Convened This Morning.

The adjourned term of the circuit court was convened at Coquille today by Judge John S. Coke. The old grand jury was in session and the unfinished business of last term will be disposed of, and it is expected that a number of indictments will be returned by the grand jury.

There are over two hundred cases on the docket for the regular December term, which will open next Monday.

Among the criminal matters to come up will be the Joe Coach case from Bandon, which the grand jury left open at the last term for further investigation, and the Gunboat Smith case.

The Gustafson case is likely to be also made a matter of investigation by the grand jury. Gustafson, known as "Singstacken" was arrested for violating his parole by drunkenness, and it is stated that he will give evidence as to who furnished the liquor.

A large number of Marshfield attorneys went to Coquille today.

Judge John P. Hall went over to hold the monthly session of probate court. The Coos County commissioners will also be in session next Wednesday.
