THE THIRD RAISE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.—For the third time within six months the rate on lumber between Astoria and Grays Harbor and this port and those of Southern California have been raised. The rate to San Pedro and San Diego from northern points is now \$5.75 per 1000 feet. The rate to San Francisco is 50 cents less. This means a raise of 75 cents since April. The added price has been more than offset by the raise in the price of lumber to the builders. It is believed that next year, when the new steamers, now under construction and those completed have arrived on the Pacific, the rate will go down. If this should happen, it is expected that as soon as the Panama Canal is being operated, the movement of the larger steamships through the canal to the Atlantic will again cause a scarcity of lumber bottoms and the rates will go up.

EUREKA TO BE RAIL CENTER

Humboldt Bay Expects Many Railways Soon—Line to Coos Bay.

That Eureka, within the next five years will become the central point in a network of railroads which will cover northwestern California, is now assured beyond all doubt.

The construction of a railroad from Medford, Oregon, to Crescent City now appears certain, as indicated by a dispatch from Crescent City, while the construction of a coast railroad from Eureka to Coos Bay via Crescent City has been assured for some time.

It is now an established fact that within two years at the latest, Eureka and San Francisco will be linked by the Northwestern Pacific.

The Willamette and Pacific, a Southern Pacific corporation, has articles of incorporation on file at the court house in this city which proclaim its intention of building a railroad from Eugene, Oregon, to Marshfield and thence down the coast to Crescent City and Eureka.

Eureka is named as a terminal point in the articles of incorporation filed here by the Willamette and Pacific. Work is now in progress on the Eugene-Marshfield section of this railroad and it is stated, as published in the Herald heretofore, that construction operation on the Marshfield-Eureka division will be inaugurated next spring.

If the Democratic administration adopts a more liberal policy as regards conservation, which is confidently expected, the construction of the projected Humboldt and Eastern railroad, connecting Eureka and Red Bluff or Redding will be made possible and Eureka will become almost as great a railroad center as Los Angeles, with more than San Francisco.

The San Francisco-Eureka Crescent City-Marshfield-Eugene railroad is now positively assured, and there seems to be an excellent prospect for the projected Medford-Crescent City railroad being constructed.

CRESCENT CITY LINE

Battle Between Hill and Harriman Companies Expected.

CRESCENT CITY, Dec. 2.—Battle lines are being drawn between the Hill and Harriman interests for control of the situation in obtaining rights-of-way for a railroad from Medford to this city, says the Medford Sun, in summing up the many rumors and facts that have been afloat for several days past.

Barnum road, which operates between Medford and Jacksonville, are securing a grade over the divide west of Jacksonville toward Applegate, which became necessary only since the Hill interests have invaded Rogue River valley and the Medford-Crescent City road appeared on a good footing. The grading near Jacksonville is supposed to be the Harriman interests, as the Barnum road is under bond to a representative of that system. It is rumored that certain real estate in Medford has been sold to railroad interests for terminal grounds.
