Council to Meet.—The Marshfield city council will meet tomorrow night to canvass today's election returns and also to take up other city matters, street improvements, etc. Whether the water company's application for a franchise will come up is not known, but it may.

Eastside Election.—The annual city election is being held in Eastside today. Quite a few women are voting there. Mrs. C. E. Jordan, wife of Mayor Jordan, was the first woman to vote in Eastside. She is the oldest resident of Eastside.

Wins in Peoria.—Word has been received here that Earl Henderson, of Muscatine, Iowa, who engaged in a number of prize fights on the Bay a few years ago, defeated Fred Delford in the fourth round of what was to have been a 10-round go at Peoria, Ill., November 21.

Want Postoffice.—Postmaster Curtis has forwarded to Washington a petition from residents of Libby asking the government to give them a mail service. They want daily service and since there are about 150 people to be supplied it is believed that the government will grant the request.

Wagon Stole.—Mrs. George Robertson reports that a new express wagon which she had purchased

for her son, was taken from the La Palme store at Eastside, where she left it, while making a trip to Marshfield. Unless the wagon is returned promptly, the parties taking it may be prosecuted.

Hear Socialist Lecture.—C. B. Ellis, the Portland speaker who was brought here by the local Socialists for a series of lectures, has had large audiences. He is a clever talker and the local Socialists are highly pleased with his work. The organization of a Woman's Socialist League has been postponed until a woman organizer arrives here.

Bolt a Star.—Geo. N. Bolt has received word that Willamette university defeated Montana university at Salem Thanksgiving by a score of 59 to 0. His son, Eric Bolt, who is attending Willamette, is credited with having been one of the stars of the Willamette team. Eric was one of the star athletes of the Marshfield High school.

To Hear Case.—The case of J. H. Bridges vs. E. W. Sullivan and Marie Sullivan will be tried in Justice Penneck's court Thursday. Bridges wants to eject the Sullivans, who are conducting the Lloyd Hotel, from his building. The latter state that their lease has not expired and that they will not give up possession until it does.

Anderson Not Dead.—Sheriff W. W. Gage who came over from Coquille yesterday states that the report of the death of Rol Anderson, the sole survivor of the Seelye & Anderson wreck near Bandon, must be erroneous. He says that yesterday morning Anderson was reported to be getting along nicely. Coroner Wilson, who received the report, had not confirmed it when he left this morning for Bandon to resume the investigation of the disaster.

Old Survey.—Fred Gettins, who is completing the survey for the proposed boulevard for Marshfield to the sea, found some old survey marks while engaged in the work. One was a government witness tree which was marked by Matthew A. C. Murphy, a government surveyor, May 2, 1857. Since Murphy marked it, the tree had increased 22 inches in diameter and is now nearly seven feet in diameter. Another corner found was one marked by Wm. Hall, father of Judge Hall, Tom Hall, Alec Hall and Mrs. Patterson, in 1874.

Library Meeting.—A meeting of the Marshfield Public Library committee was held last evening. Miss Topping, the librarian, reported that there was a big demand for new books and especially for mechanical works. She said that some workmen from North Bend had recently been visiting the library to secure works along this line. Gow Whys contribution of \$25 was reported and also a paid-up subscription from the Progress club for the Independent Magazine. The library is in need of more funds with which to purchase new books.

Property Not Rented.—It was reported around town that H. A. Wells had taken a long term lease on the property of Capt. Donaldson at the corner of Central and Broadway and would occupy one of the buildings in it with his Java Coffee House. There are several stores in the property now, the Toggery, McCrary's pharmacy, August Frizeen, and the Ladies' Emporium. However, as some of the leases of the present tenants do not expire until a year from now, Mr. Wells who was negotiating for the property, did not take it.
