The women of the school say they will set wholesome meal at a cost of 7 cents The meal is planned for family of six and costs exactly cents. The following is the

bill: One loaf of homemade bread, 2c; mutton, vegetables en casserole. 25c; steamed rice, 5c; bread pudding custard, 10c.

The en casserole dish, it was held, will contain as much nutriment as a 90-cent steak and makes side dishes unnecessary, since it includes vegetables. The rice is included for good measure, being richer for food value than potatoes. The women say they will prove that 285 loaves of bread may be made from one sack of good flour.
