**PLAN GOOD MEAL FOR SEVEN CENTS**

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—A blow at the high cost of living is planned by the Chicago school of Domestic Arts and Sciences in an exhibit to be given next week. The women of the school say they will set a wholesome meal at a cost of 7 cents a plate. The meal is planned for a family of six and costs exactly 42 cents. The following is the bill:

One loaf of homemade bread, 2c; mutton, vegetables en casserole, 25c; steamed rice, 5c; bread pudding custard, 10c.

The en casserole dish, it was held, will contain as much nutriment as a 90-cent steak and makes side dishes unnecessary, since it includes vegetables. The rice is included for good measure, being richer for food value than potatoes. The women say they will prove that 285 loaves of bread may be made from one sack of good flour.

**FURNITURE TO ADVANCE**

Manufacturers Agree on Ten Per Cent Increase in Prices.

HIGH POINT, N. C., Dec. 5.—A general ten per cent advance in furniture is the result of a five hour secret conference here yesterday between furniture manufacturers in the southern, northern, New England and northwestern states, according to a formal statement. Representatives of both the Southern and American Furniture Manufacturer's associations were present. Increased cost of timber, mirrors, labor and materials used in manufacture of furniture are said to have made the increase necessary.
