**MAGNIFICENT SHOWING OF
OREGON PRODUCTS IS MADE**

STATE'S GREAT WEALTH IS
SHOWN IN GOVERNMENT BULLETIN SOON TO BE ISSUED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Statistics for live stock products for Oregon are presented in a bulletin soon to be issued by Director Durand of the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce and Labor. It was prepared under the supervision of John Lee Coulter, expert special agent for Agriculture.

The returns for live stock products obtained at the census of 1910, like those for crops, relate to the activities of the calendar year 1909. It is impossible to give a total representing the annual production of live stock products for the reason that the total value of products from the business of raising domestic animals for use, sale, or slaughter can not be calculated from the census returns.

Dairy Products
The number of farms in Oregon reporting dairy cows on April 15, 1910, was 36,684, but only 30,065 reported dairy products in 1909. That there should be this difference is not surprising. Doubtless some farmers who have had dairy cows in 1910 had none in 1909, while other farmers neglected to give information for the preceding year, or were unable to do so, perhaps because the farm was then in other hands. Dairy products in general are somewhat less accurately reported than the principal crops. This is particularly the case as regards the quantity of milk produced. The number of farms, which made any report of milk produced during 1909 was 27,564 (some what less than the total number reporting dairy products) and the number of dairy products on such farms on April 15, 1910, was 134,000. The amount of milk reported was 56,107,000 gallons; assuming that there were the same number of cows in 1909 as in 1910, this would represent an average of 417 gallons per cow. In considering this average, however, it should be borne in mind that the quantity of milk reported is probably deficient and that the distinction between dairy and other cows is not strictly observed in the official returns.

By reason of the incompleteness of the returns for milk produced, the Census Bureau has made no attempt to determine the total value of dairy products for 1909. For convenience, a partial total has been presented, comprising the reported value of milk, cream and butter fat sold and the reported value of butter and cheese made, whether for home consumption or for sale. The total this obtained for 1909 is \$6,067,000, which may be defined as the total value of dairy products, exclusive of milk and cream used on the farm producing.
Only about one-fourth of the amount of milk reported as produced by Oregon farmers in 1909 was sold as such. Large quantities of milk and cream were sold on the butter-fat basis. The butter made on farms in 1909 was valued at \$1,600,000. Comparisons are made between 1909

and 1899 for but few of the census items relating to dairy products, for the reason that in 1899 estimates were made for farms with incomplete reports, which was not done at the census in 1910. The figures for milk produced and milk sold are particularly affected, but those for butter and cheese are approximately comparable. There was a material decrease between 1899 and 1909 in the amount of butter made and a still greater relative decrease in the production of cheese.

Wool
The total number of sheep of shearing age in Oregon on April 15, 1910, was 1,958,000, representing a decrease of 0.2 per cent, as compared with the number on June 1, 1900 (1,961,000). The approximate production of wool during 1909 was 2,126,000 fleeces, weighing 18,842,000 pounds, and valued at \$3,783,000. Of these totals about one-eighth per cent represents estimates. The number of fleeces produced in 1909 was 0.6 per cent less than 1899. The average weight of fleece in 1909 was 8.9 pounds, as compared with 8.6 pounds in 1899, and the average value per pound was 20 cents, as compared with 13 cents in 1899.

Goat Hair and Mohair
Although 4,144 farmers reported 185,000 goats and kids on their farm April 15, 1910, only 3,075 reported the production of goat hair or mohair during 1909. These farmers reported 142,000 fleeces, weighing 523,000 pounds, and valued at \$128,000. The production showed a decided increase between 1899 and 1909. Many farmers, who have goats, do not produce goat hair or mohair, but it is believed that the report is somewhat short of the actual production.

Poultry Products.
The total number of fowls on Oregon farms on April 15, 1910, was 1,824,000. Of the 37,126 farms reporting fowls, 6,560 did not report any eggs produced in 1909, and 7,790 did not report any poultry raised in 1909. The production of eggs actually reported for the year 1909 was 10,556,000 dozens, valued at \$2,582,000. According to the Twelfth Census reports the production of eggs in 1899 was 7,710,000 dozens, the value being \$1,162,000. The latter figures, however, are somewhat in excess of the actual returns at that census, because they include estimates made to cover those cases where the schedules reported fowls on hand reporting the production of eggs. In order to make the returns for 1909 comparable with those published for 1899 similar estimates have been made, the method of estimate and the justification thereof being substantially the same as in the case of wool. The total production of eggs in 1909, including these estimates, was 11,907,000 dozens, valued at \$2,912,000. The total production of poultry in 1909, including estimates made on the same basis as for eggs, was 2,655,000 fowls, valued at \$1,417,000.

Honey and Wax
Although, 8,861 farms reported 47,285 colonies of bees on hand April 15, 1910, 3,428 of these farms, with 11,498 colonies on hand April 15,

1910, made no report of honey returns produced in 1909. The 476, and 8,383 pounds of wax, valued at \$2,034. The true totals are doubtless somewhat above these figures.

Domestic Animals
The total value of domestic animals sold during 1909 was \$14,900 on farms \$2,461,000, making a aggregate of \$17,434,000. This, however, involves considerable deduction, resulting from the resale of animals which had been purchased by the farmers during the same year.

The value of the cattle (including calves) sold during 1909 represents about one-half of the total value of animals sold, and the value of the sold represented about one-fourth of the total.

The census of 1900 called for receipts of the sales of all domestic animals on the farms reporting the value of those slaughtered during the year 1899, which amounts respectively, to \$6,598,000 and \$566,000. The item of sales is closely comparable with that for 1909 when the inquiry covered all sales, whether of animals raised on the farms reporting or elsewhere. It is believed, however, that in some cases the returns for 1899 included receipts from sales of animals not actually raised on the farm reporting.
