POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS.

THE postal savings banks are doing so well that government officials believe the maximum amount that may be deposited in a month should be raised from a hundred to a thousand dollars. Many postmasters are obliged to refuse considerable amounts because the sums offered are over the maximum permitted by law. At the same time statistics of the regular savings banks show the

largest deposits in their history. Much of the money offered to the postal banks is said to show evidence of having been hoarded. Many deposits come from timid persons who distrust ordinary banks but who are ready to trust the government. In this way the postal depositories have added to the money actually in circulation about twenty-eight million dollars, because the deposits are placed by the postmasters in banks that have qualified to receive such funds and thus the money becomes available for carrying on the business of the country, instead of being hoarded.

BIG DEMAND FOR STEEL.

Unfilled Orders of Corporation Are Increasing.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The unfilled tonnage of the United States Steel corporation on November 30 totalled 7,852,883 tons, an increase of 258,502 over October 31. This is the largest tonnage ever recorded on the books of the corporation. Compared with the unfilled orders, the amount was 4,141,955 November 30, 1911.

COOS BAY JETTY.

J. N. Teal Urges It Before House Rivers and Harbors Committee.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—J. N. Teal of Portland occupied the entire time allotted to Oregon before the House Rivers and Harbors committee last week. Teal strongly urged that it was necessary to complete the Celilo Canal in five years, instead of in six and detailed the benefits to the Coast shippers from this project. He also spoke on the Coos Bay jetty and the necessity of its early completion. Congressman Hawley, who presided over the House committee during the discussion of Oregon matters, notified the committee that he would later go over all the Oregon projects in detail.

ARCHBALD CASE UP.

Prosecution Will Conclude Presentation of Testimony This Week.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Representative Clayton, chairman of the house managers prosecuting the impeachment of Judge Robert W. Archbald of the commerce court, announced today that he expected to conclude the presentation of the evidence for the prosecution by the end of the week. Archbald is accused of using his position as a federal judge to secure credit and business favors from possible litigants in his court and will fight vigorously to show that a conspiracy existed among certain Scranton, Pa., people to discredit him.
