### BRIEFS OF BANDON.

News of City-by-the-Sea as Told by the Recorder.

A resolution was passed by the Bandon city council ordering the city attorney to draw an ordinance making it a misdemeanor and prohibiting minors under 18 from carrying fire arms within the city limits and providing a penalty for the same.

Capt. O. Wren, co-operative observer, says that the rainfall during the month of November was the greatest for any single month since he has been in charge of the local lighthouse. It was 10.96 inches.

Mr. and Mrs. Steve Johnson's house on Three Mile was burned to the ground last Tuesday morning. Mr. Johnson on retiring in the evening fixed up the fire thinking to keep it up all night, and somehow the house caught fire toward morning.

### PORT OF COQUILLE

Bandon and Coquille Men Arranging for Special Election.

The Bandon Recorder says: The committee on Port Commission from the Coquille Commercial Club, composed of A. T. Morrison, Geo. E. Peoples and John Leneve, came down to Bandon yesterday and met with the committee from the local club. The members of the Bandon committee are J. L. Kronenberg, Elbert Dyer and G. T. Treadgold.

The joint committee met in the private room of the commercial club and discussed various phases of the proposition. All were enthusiastic and very much in favor of going ahead with the election, and to work up other details of the situation.

The consensus of opinion was that the port could be organized without any delays on account of legal technicalities as we will be able to profit by the experience of all the other ports that have been organized under the law.

### REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

Retiring Investigators Make Recommendations to the Court.

Before being dismissed at Coquille this week, the old grand jury made the final report to Judge Coke.

We, the grand jury of Coos county, Oregon, convened at the regular September, 1912, term of the circuit court of said county, do respectfully submit our final account.

We have diligently inquired into the commission of all crimes that have been brought to our attention and have disposed of them according to our best judgment upon the law and evidence.

We have inquired into the conduct of the county surveyor's office and county court's business and conduct in reference to the laying out, establishing and opening county roads and find that the same have been loosely conducted without reference to sound business principles and without making and keeping detailed records of costs, disbursements and expenditures and receipts. That bills have been approved and paid without the proper details having been presented so that the same can be readily checked up, examined and the truth or falsity of the same accurately determined.

We recommend that proper and suitable action be taken by the county court so as to install and maintain a suitable, efficient, explicit and detailed statement of all costs and expenses incurred in the matter of county roads and other public business and that an up-to-date business system be employed in all county affairs.
