TOO MANY ONIONS

Over 50,000 Sacks to Be Thrown Away in California.
STOCKTON, Cal., Dec. 12.—Onions are such a drug on the market in Stockton that 50,000 sacks will be dumped into the river, according to island farmers. Over production has kept the warehouses full and the prices are so low that it will not pay to keep them stored. Growers had no difficulty in disposing of their onions at \$2 per sack last year, but they are going begging at 25 cents now. Many sales are recorded at 10 and 15 cents a sack. Potatoes are only 30 cents a sack.
