

DOG SAVES MANY LIVES

Barking Till Twenty Lodgers Are Out, Is Forgotten at the Last and Burns.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 12.—A dog belonging to John "Shen," who runs a lodging house in this city sacrificed his life the other morning to save the lives of his family and the others, some 20 in number.

A lamp in the hallway of the lodging house, left turned down for the night, exploded in the morning hours and set fire to the house. The dog roused his master and then ran from room to room barking and waking the lodgers. He became confused, however, and was forgotten by those he had saved, and was burned to death.

The building was destroyed, but the lives were lost, and no one was injured, owing to the activity of "Shen," who was given a funeral.

WOMEN WEAR TROUSERS

Mrs. Catt, Suffragette Leader, Advocates Chinese Style of Dress.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—"Make a bonfire of your hats; throw away your corsets and wear trousers instead of these ridiculous tight skirts," is the recommendation of Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, the suffragette leader, to the Equal Suffrage League in her report of her two years' round-the-world campaign in behalf of votes for women.

"My trip around the world convinced me," says Mrs. Catt, "that my own country women are the most fettered, sartorially, to be found anywhere. Compared with the Chinese woman, the American woman is almost as helpless as a baby. It is time for the Western woman to kick herself free of the swaddling draperies which the Parisian sends over to us. We should declare our independence in dress as we have in politics and the sooner we do it, the better for health, happiness and the cause."

Mrs. Catt advocates the Chinese dress or a modification of it because it is the "most sanitary, healthful, comfortable and artistic costume a woman can wear." She describes the Chinese costume as including "loose, straight hanging trousers, made of silk or other material, and over this garment a straight, loose coat which comes below the knees usually, and buttons over one side. This garment is collarless, with sleeves that are half tight and end between the elbow and the wrist."

PLANS GIVEN OF BIRDMAN

Will Build Big Flying Machine in Portland.

The Portland Journal says: Silas Christofferson, the young man who has given Portland and Marshfield so many aviation thrills, and who recently capped an aviation romance with a honeymoon trip by aeroplane, has gone to San Francisco to enter the aeroplane manufacturing business and conduct a school of instruction for flyers there. He believes that at present there is a broader field for aviation in San Francisco than in Portland.

Christofferson has just incorporated under the laws of Oregon a company for the manufacture of aeroplanes, with a capital stock of \$10,000. His associates are Ernest Hammer, for some time his partner here, and Harry Twitchell, formerly an automobile agent in Portland.

An aeroplane "limousine," so called because it will have a body almost like that of a limousine car, designed to carry four passengers, is now under construction by Christofferson. He declares it will be even safer than the present hydro-aeroplane in which he has flown so often over Portland. It, too, will be equipped with the pontoon attachment by which it can rise or descend and float on the water.

A trip from San Francisco to Los Angeles is a feat that Christofferson will attempt soon.

BUTTER JUMPS UP HIGHER

Price Jumps Two Cents on Portland Market.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—There was a two-cent advance in the Portland butter market Tuesday. The reason given for the rise was the shortage in the local supply, which is usual at this time of year, and also the higher prices prevailing in the East.

It is necessary to bring in a considerable quantity of Eastern butter in the fall and winter months to make up for the deficiency in the Oregon supply, and the market here is, therefore, governed by the changes in the Eastern dairy districts. At the present wholesale price of 39 cents, butter is higher in the Portland market than it has been for two years at this season. Local wholesale prices on the corresponding date in previous years were as follows: 1911, 37 cents; 1910, 37 cents; 1909, 39 cents; 1908, 37 cents; 1907, 35 cents; 1905, 30 cents; 1904, 30 cents.

These prices apply to the best grade of city made butter. Outside creamery brands generally sell lower. The cheapest price this year on city creamery butter was 25 cents in the first week in May.

While butter is advancing, eggs are working downward in price. The wholesale quotation now is 42 1/2 cents as against 45 cents just before Thanksgiving on the best Oregon ranch product. The egg market here, like the butter market, is governed to a certain extent in the winter months by prices and market conditions in the East. In the Eastern cities storage eggs are being offered freely at the present time and this is unsettling the egg market throughout the country. It is a rule with egg speculators never to carry stocks in storage after the first of the year, and the December market is therefore generally disturbed by the unloading that occurs at the big storage centers.

COOKING IN CAMP.

Recipe for Dumplings and Bacon Is Given.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 12.—A recipe for delicious dumplings and bacon for camping parties is given in the book on "Camp Cookery," published by the domestic science department of the Oregon Agricultural College. The book has proven so popular that the first edition has been exhausted and at present no funds are available for a reprint, so excerpts will be published in the papers from time to time.

For bacon and dumplings in camp, put enough sliced bacon for the party into a hot frying pan and fry until crisp and brown, and remove. Pour in boiling water until the pan is half full. Make a stiff batter of two cups of flour, four teaspoons of baking powder, 1 tablespoon of grease and enough water to make it the right thickness. Drop the batter into the bacon gravy by spoonfuls, cover, and cook until well done. Thicken the gravy after the dumplings are removed with a little flour and water batter, and serve with the crisp bacon.

Bacon fritters can be made by slicing the bacon (or pork) and after soaking it in water for an hour, rolling it in corn meal or flour, and frying it in bacon grease.

STRANGE FIRE CAUSE.

Focused Rays from Beer Bottle Cause Fire in Forests.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—If you are a hunter and wish to be disassociated, even remotely from the possible accusation of starting a forest fire, on your next journey to the wooded lands, do not take a beer bottle along. J. R. Welty, state forester and fire warden of Washington, thinks that the beer bottle is not only a possible, but a probable cause of some of the mysterious forest conflagrations that are frequently met with. Mr. Welty said that frequently the thick bottoms of the beer bottles acted as perfect sun-glasses, igniting the dry grass or twigs adjacent, and gave as a proof the statement of J. Markson, a Tacoma man, who actually extinguished a forest fire in the embryo, which was just starting under the concentrated rays of the sun reflected through the bottom of a beer bottle. The bottle had been tossed carelessly aside by some traveler, broken, and the bottom was in exactly the right position for focusing. Steps will be taken to get a law passed prohibiting the laying aside of bottles of this character in the forest, or at least a regulation will be secured compelling thirsty forest migrants to bury their bottles.
