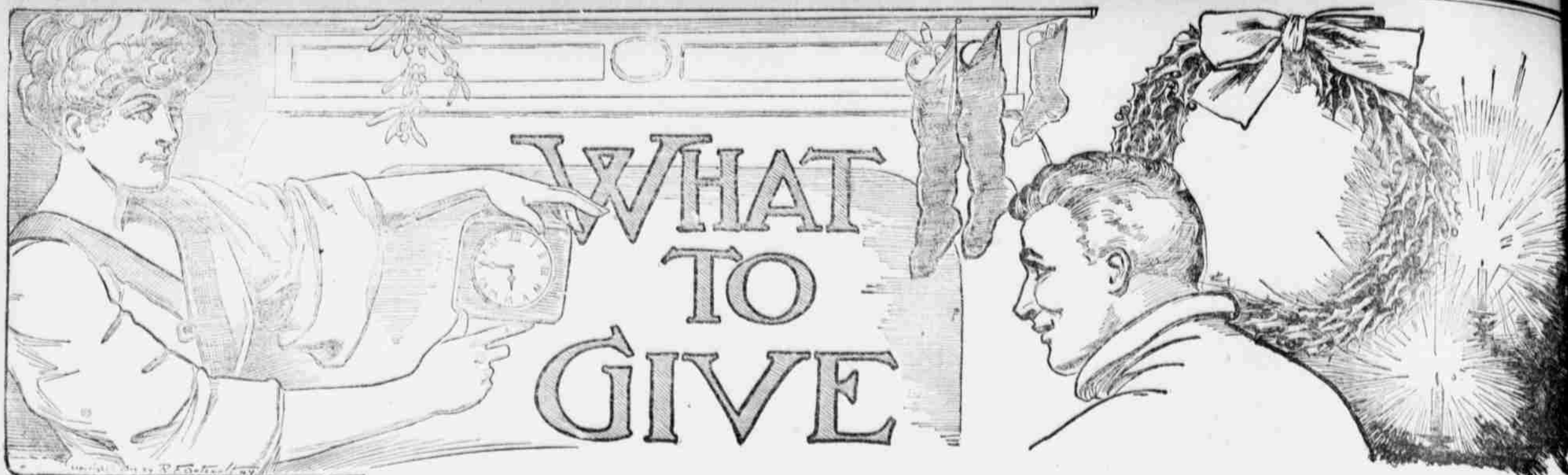

Grand Jury Adjourns.—The Coos county grand jury adjourned yesterday for the term. It was reported that they brought in two indictments, the identity of the parties not being given out, owing to the arrests not having been made. A logger named Dunning was indicted early in the week for forgery.

Gets Hydroplane.—Messrs. Gorst and King returned on the Redondo today from Los Angeles where they placed the order for a three-passenger hydroplane. They also bought two eight-passenger trailers to be used with their present cars in the North Bend-Marshfield auto service.

Marshal Carter responded and finally trailed the individual to near the Mills home, near Eleventh and Central, where he was arrested. He was badly intoxicated and gave his name as Victor Ward. He arrived here but a few days ago

from Washington. He was a young man and was fined \$10 by Recorder Butler today and admonished to be careful.

Divorce Refused.—Judge Coke yesterday refused a divorce to Mrs. Mary D. Epperson, who was suing J. C. Epperson. She charged cruel and inhuman treatment. The trial lasted all day and some very salacious evidence was given. They have nine children. They formerly conducted a second hand store on Broadway in this city.
