**Means of Improving Coos

At the good roads meeting at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last evening, it was decided to take up the matter of building a good highway from Myrtle Point to Roseburg, with the Douglas county commissioners and the Roseburg Commercial club and see if Douglas county would build its share of the road if Coos county builds its portion. It was also decided to try and have the Oregon legislature hasten the necessary action to make the two per cent bonding law available and to continue the campaign of education and to make a hard membership campaign.

**STRICKEN SOON
AFTER MOTHER**

Thirteen-months-old Child of J. H. LaChapelle Dies Suddenly.

Douglas La Chapelle, the 13-months-old son of J. H. LaChapelle, died at 6 o'clock this morning at the home of Mr. La Chapelle's brother, Charles La Chapelle, on South Broadway, after less than 36 hours' illness of membranous croup.

The death was a sad shock to the many friends of the family. Douglas' mother died about two weeks ago and was taken last week by the father and husband to the old home at Chippewa Falls, Wis., for burial. He should have reached there Wednesday night or Thursday with the body and it is hardly believed that the funeral was held there before the telegram announcing his child's death reached him today.

He wired back to have the body shipped east for burial beside the mother. It will be shipped tomorrow on the Redondo and prior to the departure at 2 o'clock short funeral services will be conducted at Wilson's undertaking parlors by Rev. J. E. Burkhardt.
