




ELECTION IN BANDON.

Voters Pass on Several School Propositions.

The Bandon Recorder says: Five questions were presented for discussion and vote at the special school meeting held in the school building Wednesday evening, December 10. The questions were

as follows: First-To levy a tax of 13 mills for the maintenance of the school and for payment of interest on indebtedness. The vote was 134 to 12 in favor of the tax. Second-To authorize the district board to sell the old schoolhouse for a sum not less than \$2000. The vote on this question was 55 yes
