L. W. W. AT EUGENE.

Thrown Into Jail for Assaulting Workman.

EUGENE, Dec. 17.—James F. Morgan, leader of the I. W. W. here, is in the county jail charged with assault and battery on a strikebreaker. It was expected by the officers that the strike would make some kind of a demonstration upon Morgan's incarceration, but everything seems to quiet at the I. W. W. headquarters.

Morgan and another member of the I. W. W. are accused of kicking and otherwise roughly handling Brown. Brown recently quit work for the railway company. Only a few days ago he was admitted as a member and paid his initiation fee. He soon of idleness and entered the employ of the P. E. & E., but quit working two or three days.

The I. W. W. claim a big membership here and about 50 or 60 men are fed and lodged out of a fund claimed to have been contributed by the organization all over the country.

MEETS WITH ACCIDENT.

The unfortunate man became tangled with a line of cable and sustained a number of broken ribs, while several others were torn loose from his breast bone. While he is prettily injured he is not in a dangerous condition. His father left Bandon, where the injured man was being cared for at the hospital, Myrtle Point Enterprise.

BREAKS COAL TRUST.

Wickersham's Opinion in the Anthracite Cases.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Attorney General Wickersham has issued a statement regarding the United States supreme court's hard coal decision in which he said: "It is believed that this decision will completely destroy the combination which controls the price of anthracite coal and that it must result in instant measures for the benefit of the public."

PLAN NEW PORT.

Coquille and Bandon Men Arrange to Improve Lower Coquille.

The Coquille Herald says: At a recent meeting of the Coquille Commercial club a committee consisting of Mayor A. T. Morrison, John Leneve, and Ned C. Kelley was appointed to work in conjunction with J. L. Kronenberg, Elbert Dyer, and G. T. Treadgold—a committee from the Bandon Commercial club, in formulating details having in view the organization of a port commission for the Coquille river.

An organization was perfected by electing J. L. Kronenberg, chairman; E. E. Johnson, vice chairman and Mr. Mills, secretary and treasurer.

A petition is being formulated and a map of the river from the terminus of the Myrtle Point port will be made, and other matters in compliance with law will be adhered to.

ELECTION IN BANDON.

Voters Pass on Several School Propositions.

The Bandon Recorder says: Five questions were presented for discussion and vote at the special school meeting held in the school building Wednesday evening, December 10. The questions were as follows:

First—To levy a tax of 13 mills for the maintenance of the school and for payment of interest on indebtedness. The vote was 134 to 12 in favor of the tax.

Second—To authorize the district board to sell the old schoolhouse for a sum not less than \$2000. The vote on this question was 55 yes and 88 no.

Third—To authorize the sale of the old schoolhouse and lots on which it stands for not less than \$5000. On this proposition the

URGES BETTER WAGES FOR OREGON TEACHERS

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 17.—Praising the educational system of the state generally, but deploring the low wages paid teachers as a whole, Labor Commissioner Hoff in his biennial report expresses the hope that the women of the state will cause the scale of compensation to be raised now that they have the ballot.

The report says that when comparison is made with other states the people have every reason to feel proud of the state's educational system, save in the matter of compensation and that this is about 50 per cent lower than that paid in California.

Fourth—To authorize the board to purchase the Lundquist property for \$3500. The vote was 10 yes and 135 no.

Fifth—To authorize the board to purchase or otherwise acquire land for a school site east of Columbia avenue and issue interest bearing time warrants to pay for same. The proposition carried by a vote of 114 yes to 31 no.
