### VISIT SCENES OF EXPLOSIONS

Defendants in Dynamite Conspiracy Trial Queried About Trips.

[By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.]  
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 14.—Visits by some of the defendants to the scenes of explosions on non-union jobs were explained by them at the dynamite conspiracy trial today. Paul J. Morrin of St. Louis testified that three weeks after the work of an "Open Shop" contractor at Mount Vernon, Illinois, was blown up in April, 1910, he was instructed by John J. McNamara, then secretary of the Iron Workers to unionize the men. He said he found a reward was offered for the dynamiter and so wrote McNamara. McNamara confessed to having caused the Mt. Vernon explosion. Previously Frank M. Ryan, president of the Union, had written McNamara that Morrin could take care of Mount Vernon, but Ryan denied it concerned dynamiting. Whether he approved the speech by Emily Seidel of Milwaukee, denouncing the courts and branding the arrest of John J. McNamara as "kidnaping," and whether he approved of the protest against "kidnaping" sent to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, were questions asked of Morrin. Morrin said he didn't approve but he had not protested against the speech of Seidel. He voted for a resolution sent to Gompers and for the resolution expressing confidence in McNamara.

### GAMBLING ON WALL STREET

Operations of New York Stock Exchange Told Before Congress.

[By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.]  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Two governors of the New York Stock Exchange today told the House "money trust" committee at least part of the transactions of the stock market were of a gambling nature. Frank K. Sturgis and Rudolph Keppler were witnesses under examination. Both were former presidents of the exchange. Sturgis was led through a long discussion of the moral aspect of "short sales" or "sales of stock which the seller does not possess." He admitted personally that he believed the "moral obliquity" of such a transaction overcame any argument in its favor. He said, however, "it was not part of my duty to urge moral reforms upon the community." He held that "the duty of the stock exchange toward the public was only to see that a proper place was maintained for buying and selling and that proper restrictions were observed." Keppler declared that "manipulation" was perfectly proper so long as it was legitimately conducted, the commissions were paid and there was no conclusion. He said "some transactions on the stock exchange are somewhat of a gambling nature."

### BUTTER GOES UP, EGGS DOWN

Marked Fluctuations in the Produce Market at Portland Last Week.

PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—The Telegram says: Among events of interest in the market last week were an advance in the cost of butter and a decline in eggs. Best grade creamery butter, which a week ago sold at 85 cents a roll, now holds at 90 cents, and the dealers say there would be nothing surprising in a further lift in the cost of the commodity about the end of the year. Eggs are coming in from the country in greater quantities than for some time past, and for that reason prices had to give way. Best locals now are selling at 50 to 55 cents a dozen, as against 55 to 60 cents last week. Wild ducks were available at 25 to 65 cents apiece. Geese are going at 60 cents to \$1 apiece, according to size, and rabbits are freely offered at a quarter apiece. In the domestic poultry market prices remain about the same as those of a week ago, hens going at 20 cents a pound, broilers at 20 to 25, ducks and geese at 25 and dressed turkeys at 25 to 30. The markets are fairly well supplied with all lines.

### FOOTBALL CAPTAIN NAMED.

Washington Boys Make Close Race For Athletic Honor.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 17.—"Hunky" Shaw of Aberdeen, Wash., for two years and a half on the O. A. C. football team, has just been elected captain of the gridiron squad for the next year, after a close race against another Washington boy, Don Kellogg of Hoquiam who has played on the team three years and is extremely popular. Three ballots were taken before a decision between these two candidates could be made.

The sixteen men granted football monograms, who elected the captain, are D. Kellogg, Hoquiam; Wash.; T. E. May, Portland; Paul Hofer, Salem; Robert Christian, Danville, Ky.; O. Sitton, Corvallis; "Prunes" Moore, Harrisburg; Benjamin Robertson, Portland; George Dewey, Ashland; Charles Reynolds, La Grande; Ira Blackwell, Aberdeen, Wash.; James Evenden, Warrenton; J. N. Shaw, Aberdeen; W. S. Richardson, Salem; Gordon Rasmussen of Marshfield; A. L. Larsen, Astoria; L. M. McKenzie, Summerville.

Those given service stripes to wear on their arms are as follows: Four years' play on the first team: Evenden, Reynolds and Sitton; three years, Kellogg and May; two years, Christian, Moore, Robertson, Shaw, Richards and Rasmussen.
