His plan is to put in the large heating plant on his property in the rear of the Chandle Hotel, He now has a franchise for the streets around the Chandler, but to carry out his new project it will be necessary for him to secure franchises on additional streets, probably covering the district from the Williams block south of Curtis avenue to north of Market avenue, and from front street to Fourth street.

He is contemplating the installa-tion of the plant next spring and will probably take definite steps in the matter in a few days.
