HEATING PLANT TO BE PUT IN

W. S. Chandler May Supply All Business Houses in Down Town Section.

W. S. Chandler is considering plans for a large central heating plant which will heat all of the business buildings in the downtown section of Marshfield. He has practically made up his mind to install a central heating plant for the Chandler Hotel, the Coke building, the First National Bank building and the new Chandler block, when it occurred to him that it would be advantageous all around probably to have a central heating system for the business district. His plan is to put in the large heating plant on his property in the rear of the Chandler Hotel. He now has a franchise for the streets around the Chandler, but to carry out his new project it will be necessary for him to secure franchises on additional streets, probably covering the district from the Williams block south of Curtis avenue to north of Market avenue, and from front street to Fourth street. He is contemplating the installation of the plant next spring and will probably take definite steps in the matter in a few days.
