new buildings there next spring. An oil burning plant will probably be put in. There was a brief discussion of it and the council instructed City Attorney Goss to draft an amendment to the original franchise and submit it at the next meeting of the council.

Bill for Water.
A bill for \$444 for water rent for the flushing tanks of the sewage systems was presented by the Coos Bay Water Co. One bill was for four years and a half, another for two years and a half and a third for a year and a half. None of the council knew much about it. Councilman Savage said he knew the city used the water and he guessed it would have to be paid. Finally on motion of Councilman Coppel, it was referred to the fire and water committee to look up and report.

Improvement Bonds.
City Recorder Butler reported that in addition to the \$109 premium which the Eastern bond house had recently paid for the special issue of \$17,000 worth of improvement bonds, there was \$109 accrued interest which went to the city's general fund. He said that as the semi-annual interest would be due before the parties taking out the bonds made their first payment, he would suggest that this extra sum of \$218 be put in the interest fund. The council thought that it would be better to follow the law in the matter.

An ordinance providing for the sale of \$339.56 worth of special improvement bonds on the improvement of Fourth street between Elrod and Central was adopted.

Routine Business.
A bill from R. A. Corthell for repairing the city hall roof was held up because it was reported that the roof was still leaking.

The minutes of three previous sessions of council were read and it was joyfully moved that City Recorder Butler be given a vote of thanks.

During the storm that prevailed, the city hall shook considerably and the noise from it and the wind caused some remark from some of the councilmen about the safety of the building, but Mayor Straw joyfully suggested that the noise was caused by Levi Smith and Bill Shoupe snoring down stairs.

A number of current expense bills were allowed.

COOS BAY IN NEED OF HOMES

Editor Daily Times:

I notice your big head line, "Boost for a Bigger and Better Coos Bay." Yes, you bet. But are we justified in boosting. It's surely every one's duty to tell of Coos Bay's many wonderful resources and other splendid advantages. What is it going to get any one of us to boost and encourage people to come in here, and when they come they cannot get places to live in; when they come and have to leave because of not being able to get a cottage or apartment or anything, in fact, to live in? Can those people go away with a kindly feeling towards this place or the people in here? Can they say a boosting word? No. They warn others to keep out if they don't want to hang up on a limb of a tree or hang out on the street corners. If all the houses, house-keeping rooms or apartments that are here for rent were empty, how many would there be? Now, unless all signs fall and all indications are at fault, there will be one of the biggest rushes and crowds of home-seekers coming in here imaginable. What is there in the way of a place to rent to sell them have we to offer?

It's a mighty hard proposition to get outside capital to come here and invest and build when home capital won't do so. When you try to interest them and tell them of the need of houses and apartments and what a good investment and interest paying proposition it is; they in turn ask: "What's the matter with those fellows there? If it is such a good opportunity, why don't they take it up, or even show their faith by beginning to put up houses and apartments for rent?" I cannot see why the Smith and Simpson lumber companies cannot build and make building a part of their industry, as some of the largest lumber companies have done in Portland in the past 10 years and made money in it, too. There is not a week but what we have from 20 to 30 calls for houses or apartments, and we are only one real estate office here, besides the number who never go near a real estate office to look for a house to rent.

The construction of new houses would mean employment for many money spent at home here. It would make boosting authentic if we can get people to come and then be able to show them a decent livable place to live in at a good fair rental. You seldom hear of the high rent. It is all "where can I get a place to live? If I can get a nice, clean, fairly modern house, we will be willing to pay a good rent."

There's money here and plenty of it. All we have to do is to wake them up to the building habit.

ance on all buildings or alterations. Another provided a change in the restriction about chimneys, stove-pipes, etc.

Another amendment was designated by Mr. Goss as putting a stop to the erection of the corrugated iron structures. He said that they not only looked bad but that they were really as dangerous as a frame building. Councilman Allen said that they were really fire-traps and ought to be stopped. The new amendment provides that where the outer walls of a building are less than three inches in thickness, metal lathing must be used. Also that where the building is more than one story high, the studding must be of steel or iron. There was some talk about making this even more stringent, but the amendments as suggested by Mr. Goss were adopted.

The city council last night renewed the licenses of fourteen of the fifteen saloons in Marshfield for the next six months. No changes in any of the places were reported.

John Herron, the fifteenth, failed to get his application in but it was stated that this was possibly due to a misunderstanding, and City Recorder Butler was instructed to issue him a license also if he files the necessary application with the payment of his license and bond.

MUCH GOSSIP ABOUT BRIDGE

REPORT IN PORTLAND PAPER THAT PERMIT IS FOR "ARM OF BAY" CAUSES CONSIDERABLE SPECULATION.

A Portland paper in a Washington dispatch concerning the War Department granting a permit to the Southern Pacific to bridge Coos Bay, states that the permit is for an "arm of Coos Bay."

The story caused much discussion around town today, some claiming that the permit was for Isthmus Inlet instead of the Bay proper, and that the railroad would come along the east side of the Bay and cross at Isthmus Inlet, a route which some have long advocated.

Others claim that the Washington message to the Portland paper was merely an error.

No other advises have been received on the Bay concerning the bridge since L. J. Simpson received the message from Senator Bourne stating that the permit had been recommended by General Bixby and that the secretary of war would probably grant it early this week.

It is hardly believed that the Southern Pacific gave up its original plan to cross from Sand Point to the mouth of Pony Inlet at North Bend.

Some are inclined to think that the Southern Pacific will have both bridges in case the line here is continued on down the coast to Eureka, the line on the east side of the bay then being used for through freights and other trains that would be delayed considerably in running through town. Besides this advantage it is claimed that such a move would give the company absolute control of the water front.

SHERIFFS' TRIPS TO SALEM MAY END SOON

SALEM, Dec. 31.—To effect a saving of about 50 per cent on the cost of bringing prisoners to the state penitentiary, Governor West has drafted a bill providing that prison guards shall go after convicts, instead of having them brought to the prison by sheriffs. This bill will be presented to the Legislature.

It used to be that sheriffs also conducted insane patients to the asylum, and Governor West pointed out that since the asylum attendants now go after patients the cost of bringing them to the institution has been cut in half.

EGG MARKET IS SOME STRONGER

No Surplus Butter on Portland Market—Cheese Quotations Firmer.

PORTLAND, Dec. 31.—In the egg market Saturday there was a generally stronger feeling than prevailed the first of the week and in some quarters a disposition to raise quotations. One of the leading local handlers of the commodity quoted 33 cents on fresh Oregon eggs carefully candled, and one of the brokers declared he was ready to pay an even better figure for stock for shipment north. Colder weather now is liable to come at any time, and this and its effect on the market the dealers evidently are figuring on.

The week closed with a firm and active butter market, and with no surplus of importance in any quarter and it is believed that the next change in prices will be an advance. Cheese supplies were reported light and the market firm in tone, with current receipts cleaning up closely. Flats held at 19 to 19½ cents a pound and young Americas at 20 to 20½c.
