COLD WAVE IS COMING TODAY

Read This and Then Shiver—Whole Country Will Suffer From Cold Snap.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—A cold wave with zero temperature in many places, will spread over almost the entire country within the next three days. The northwest will feel the cold almost immediately and be hardest hit. Extreme cold will spread quickly eastward and southward, extending throughout the east gulf and south Atlantic States within the three days.

The indications of the coming zero weather made their appearance over Alaska and the North Pacific this morning, according to the weather bureau.

TAFT FAVORS ARBITRATION

President Would Submit England's Claim About Canal to The Hague.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—President Taft, in referring this afternoon to the dispute between this country and Great Britain over the Panama Canal, said he was in favor of submitting the question to The Hague tribunal for arbitration.

"When the time comes there will be no doubt about what I will do about submitting this question to an impartial tribunal for decision. I am willing to arbitrate with Great Britain as soon as we can get down to the point at issue."

"This is just the time when I am in favor of arbitration," the president continued. "It is the time when we are afraid we might not win that tests our faith in arbitration." The president was speaking at a luncheon in his honor at the International Forum.
