**Had Narrow Escape**—Peter Scott, Sr., who returned the other day from an extended stay in Washington reports that the Dredge Oregon, which was taken from here to Grays Harbor last fall, narrowly escaped being wrecked during a recent storm at Aberdeen. The heavy gale badly damaged her pipes and pontoons. Mr. Scott has not made up his mind definitely but will probably relocate on the Bay.

**Here for Prisoners**—Sheriff Gage came over today from Coquille this morning to meet the Redondo as he is in hopes that Clint Ankers and Dick Lennon, wanted here in connection with the robbery of the North Bend News Company, were sent back on her by the San Francisco officers. He was not sure. The Redondo was kept outside by the storm today and he was unable to ascertain whether or not they came.

**Myrtle Point Death**—Henry Ploeger, who is here from Myrtle Point on business and pleasure, reports that a night nurse at the White Star hospital in Myrtle Point died suddenly there a couple of days ago. The nurse's name was Thompson and he was about 50 years old. The funeral was held today. Mr. Ploeger states that the weather has been unusually cold at Myrtle Point and vicinity. J. O. Stemmler reports that the thermometer registered about 18 below during the cold snap last week.

**Contest Ingram's Claim**—A. K. Peck, U. S. Land Commissioner, has been deputized to take evidence in the land contest of the United States vs. Dr. J. W. Ingram. It seems that the government is contesting the homestead or timber claim of Dr. Ingram, who formerly lived in Marshfield, on the ground that he did not continuously reside on the land prior to it being thrown into the U. S. Forest Reserve. The claim is in the Cour d' Alene section of Idaho. S. C. Rogers, Henry Sengstacken and Josephine Rennie have been subpoenaed to testify before Arthur K. Peck February 13, as to Dr. Ingram's residence. Other witnesses may also be called.

**Complains About Smith**—The Sunday Portland Journal contains a lengthy sensational story about Horace Stevens, a Portland attorney, complaining to United States Attorney John McCourt there about C. A. Smith and charging the latter with misuse of the mails in floating a \$4,500,000 bond issue. Stevens charges that much of the \$181,000 acres of timberlands on which Mr. Smith is floating the bond issue is now being attacked in government suits and consequently that the security is not as Mr. Smith's circular letter offering the bonds for sale represents it. Mr. McCourt has taken no action on the charges as yet. On Coos Bay, the matter is regarded as simply one of the series of groundless attacks that have been made on Mr. Smith since he started his big operations on Coos Bay.
