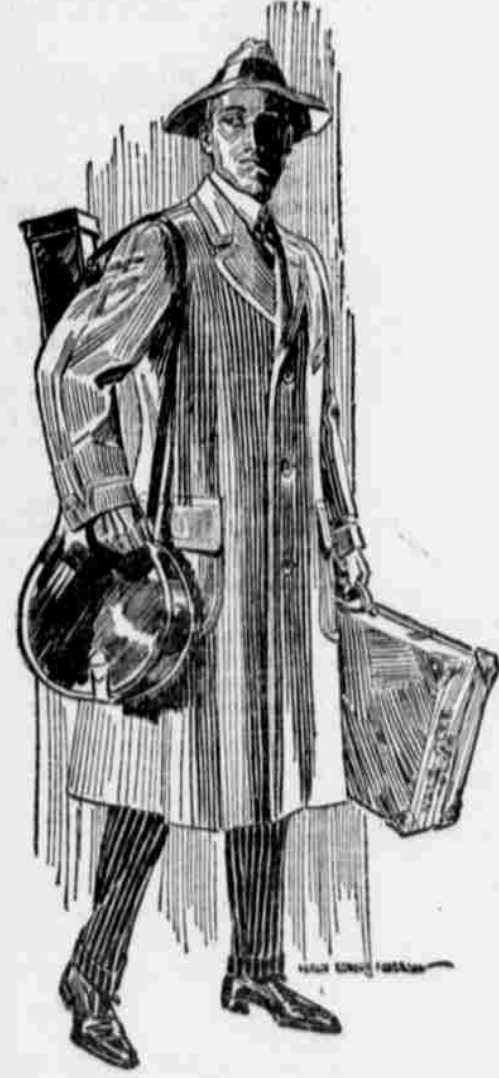

LUMBER TRADE WILL BE BRISK

Puget Sound Mills Report Excellent Prospects; Exposition Helping.

SEATTLE, Jan. 8.—With inquiries from the Panama-Pacific Exposition authorities for between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 feet of lumber to be delivered as soon as possible, lumbermen today were jubilant over the immediate outlook for the new year.

All the big mills of Puget Sound and the Grays Harbor district have been asked to make bids on this order and with the cheaper grade going out to fill it and the 100,000,000 feet of highgrade fir for the Eastern car manufacturers, on which they are now at work, lumbermen feel more optimistic over the situation than at any time for the past four years.

Added to the big orders from the three Eastern car manufacturers, placed in November, and the deliveries necessary for the Panama Exposition is the announcement that the volume of yard-line buying throughout the East and Middle West, is expected to set in in about ten days. Many inquiries from yard-line operators reaching all the big manufacturers and jobbers justify the announcement that February 1 this business, which is regarded as the best in the trade, will have reached a healthy swing.

The difficulties regarding the shortage of cars and being cleared away, as the grain movement is being taken care of, and it is not now expected that the mills will have any trouble in getting orders out. One manufacturer already has orders for 600 carloads to be shipped east.

The fact that the demand for both the higher and cheaper priced lumber comes at the same time has stimulated the trade more than any other element in years. There is no surplus of logs anywhere on Puget Sound, and log prices are very firm. The cargo business is in excellent shape, the only difficulty being that of secured tonnage for offshore orders.

Several leading manufacturers said they are preparing to meet the rush of line yard or retail dealers orders on or about January 15.

CURRY PIONEER DEAD.

E. H. Meservey, Indian Fighter, Succumbs at Rogue River Home. GOLD BEACH, Ore., Jan. 6.—E. H. Meservey died at the home of his son, Elisha Meservey, at the latter's ranch twenty-seven miles up Rogue River. The deceased had been confined to his bed for the past two months suffering from a complication of diseases common to those of advanced years.

E. H. Meservey was born in Waldo County, Maine, Dec. 19, 1824, and came to Curry County in September, 1853, and settled at Gold Beach, but later moved up Rogue River. He took a very active part in all the Indian wars in Coos and Curry Counties. He organized a company of volunteers, in 1858 on Rogue River, and was elected captain of the same.

CURRY SHINGLE MILL.

Mr. James departed for Wedderburn last week, to set in operation the new shingle mill, which the Wedderburn Trading Company have set up in connection with their new sawmill. Mr. James will cut sufficient shingles while there to supply present local requirements, and expects to return the last of the week, when his shingle mill, which has been taking its holiday vacation, will resume operations.—Gold Beach Globe.
