CALIFORNIANS SPENT \$58,320 LAST YEAR BUYING AUTOMOBILES

ENORMOUS SUM SPENT BY RESIDENTS OF GOLDEN STATE FOR BUZZ WAGONS DURING YEAR OF 1912.
SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 9.—From the records of the motor vehicle department of Secretary Jordan's office at the close of the 1912 business comes the story of how California invested approximately \$58,320,000 in automobiles and leads the continent in the number of motor cars purchased during the last 12 months.
The records show that there were 29,160 motor vehicles, exclusive of motorcycles, purchased by Californians in the year just closed. The attaches of the motor vehicle department say this number is 5000 more than New York State had approximately 19,000. There are now open borders of the state and Chinese imported here states, 92,199 motor cars, an investment of \$11,132 for chauffeurs and duplicates. This of approximately \$250,000. Comparative figures show the purchases in California increased about 10,000. The approximate value of motor vehicles for 1912 to \$75,000. Of this is for automobile \$11,132 for chauffeurs and duplicates. This remainder is made up of approximately \$250,000.

THUNDER NOISE WAS A METEOR

LARGE ASTRAL BODY DEMOLISHES TREE WHEN IT LANDS ON FARM NEAR FOREST GROVE, OREGON.
FOREST GROVE, Ore., Jan. 8.—The other morning at about 3 o'clock, during the heavy rain and wind storm people thought this section of Washington County was awakened from their sleep by a loud noise that was thought to be thunder. Reports have reached this city that the noise was made by a falling meteor, which landed on the farm of Henry Vanderzanden, near Roy. The heavenly body struck and demolished a large tree before it entered the ground and evidently was of large size. Efforts will be made to dig it up from the ground.

SWEARS OFF SMOKING: DIES SAME EVENING.
Dubuque Man Victim of Heart Failure.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 9.—John L. Baringer of Dubuque, Ia., who has been here for the past two weeks visiting friends, made a resolution to stop smoking. Four hours later he was dead.

While returning to his room at the Victoria hotel, Baringer dropped dead of heart failure on the street. He was rushed to the receiving hospital, but nothing could be done for him by the city's emergency doctors. Relatives have been notified of his death and the body will be turned over to them. Baringer was 45 years old.

INSURANCE RECEIPTS FOR YEAR ARE \$110,498
SALEM, Jan. 8.—Insurance Commissioner J. W. Ferguson has submitted a report to the governor showing that the receipts for the insurance department for the year ending November 30, 1912, were \$110,498.94, an increase of \$16,038.82 over last year. The increase includes every branch of business handled by the department.

SCHOOL AT FALLS CITY OPENS AFTER EPIDEMIC
FALLS CITY, Jan. 8.—The Falls City school has again been opened after a closedown of several weeks on account of an epidemic that was called smallpox and other names. The nine teachers and the 150 pupils have been vaccinated and the building fumigated. It is hoped that nothing further will happen to delay the work of the institution.
