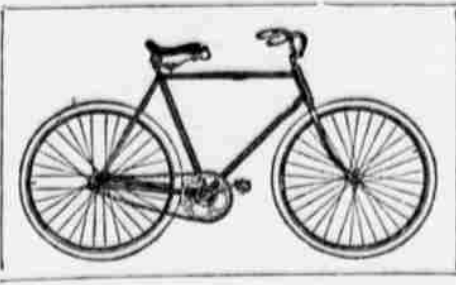

The case was brought up by half breeds, who asked that their children be allowed to attend a white school at Fort Klamath, across the river from a school on the Indian reservation. The directors there had provided separate schools for the pure blood Indians and the half breeds.
