#### L. D. CARLE, WHO MADE IT RICH IN ALASKA, DIES

ROSEBURG, Jan. 10.—Lorenzo D. Carle, a well known resident of Roseburg for nearly 30 years, died here Monday at the age of 63 years.

Mr. Carle was born in Indiana and came to Roseburg in 1883. He was one of the many thousands who went to Alaska during the gold rush of 1897, and was one of the few who struck it rich. He left Roseburg with only \$50 in money and a prospector's outfit and three years later he returned with \$21,000, and then in 1901 sold his claim for \$10,000. During the year of 1901 he shipped livestock to Alaska as a business in partnership with R. B. Dixon of Roseburg.

Mr. Carle has been an Odd Fellow for over 40 years, first joining the order in St. Louis, Mo.

Mrs. A. H. Dingman Succumbs to Attack of Bright's Disease.

Mrs. Dingman came to North Bend with her husband, A. H. Dingman, in 1900, having made the trip from Kootnai County, Idaho, in a wagon. She was born in Northern Indiana October 27, 1857, and in 1882 married Mr. Dingman in Nemaha county, Nebraska.

Mrs. Dingman leaves a husband and ten children and 22 grand children to mourn her departure. The children are Robert R. of Idaho, Charles A. William, Mrs. Ruby Heath, Harvey L. and Clifford C. of North Bend, George of Glendale, Mrs. Nellie Coleman of Marshfield, Mrs. Minnie Tobin of Coquille and Frank of Klamath Falls.

#### TO MEDIATE TROUBLE.

Firemen and Eastern Railway Settlement to Government.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Five of fifty eastern railroads have agreed with the railroad managers to Martin A. Knapp, of the U. S. States court of commerce, and Charles P. Neill, U. S. commissioner of labor, to mediate under the Erie act in their controversy over wages and working conditions. This agreement was suggested by the railroad companies. It followed the suggestion by the firemen of the railroad to proceed under the arbitration agreement carried out by the firemen of the locomotive engineers.
